EXTRAORDINARY TIME

We are in the middle of summer, according to our secular calendar. Our liturgical calendar places us

well into Ordinary Time. Ordinary Time is not named this because there is nothing special about it—<u>every</u> time we celebrate Christ's resurrection is extraordinary! Ordinary time is named reflecting its "order" rather than a specific or seasonal name. The Sundays after Pentecost are numbered. This season begins with Holy Trinity Sunday and ends with Christ the King Sunday, the end of the church year.

Like summer, the color for the season is green, which "signifies the life of the church in the Spirit, and recalls the tree of life that is Christ among us" (*Keeping Time*, 2009). Green is the color of grass that has re-emerged after a season of reduced sunlight and colder temperatures, and it is the color of newly leafed trees. In other words, this is a time to be devoted to growth and to new life.

In what areas of your life do you expend the energy it takes to grow? Do you need more patience, or would you like to be more generous? Do you want to improve your self-control? These are gifts of the Holy Spirit. Is there a relationship you would like to improve? Growing in your relationship with God will help with your other relationships.

How important is your relationship with God? Are you spending more time with God in these hazy, lazy, extraordinary days of summer? Listen to where God is speaking to you through your reading of scripture. Sit with God in prayer. At the end of your day, reflect on where you received healing and on where you were an instrument of healing. Where have you felt God nudging you or challenging you? When is the last time you engaged in devotional reading? Come join our Gospel discussions Sunday mornings between services.

Our readings for August consist mainly of Jesus using parables to teach crowds of people. These stories in Matthew's gospel reveal who Jesus is, and what the kingdom of God is like. One of the images used is that of seeds—these are seeds of faith. God provides the growth, but we can do the planting and watering. After Jesus teaches people about his identity, discipleship, and faith, he will tell them to go and to teach others. We can only accomplish this if we spend time with Jesus, first.

As I write this, I am on my way to the Virginia Synod's event, "Power In the Spirit." This is not an event for pastors only—it is like a youth retreat for adults. This is an annual event, usually held mid-July from Thursday through Saturday at Roanoke College. This year's keynote speaker is The Rev. Dr. Tim Wengert, an editor of *Book of Concord*, our Lutheran Confessions, and our Bible presenter is Rev. Tracie Bartholomew, Bishop of the New Jersey Synod. There are worship services and workshops; our own **Jim Cobb** is leading a workshop on the historic and continuing relevance of the Augsburg Confession. **Ellen Bushman**, **Judy Cobb**, **Heidi Flatin** and **Sandy Peterkin** are here, too. Any one of us would love to tell you more! Will you join us next year? Summer, the time of growth, will be here again.

I pray that, according to the riches of his glory, he may grant that you may be strengthened in your inner being with power through his Spirit, and that Christ may dwell in your hearts through faith, as you are being rooted and grounded in love [Ephesians 3:16-17].

"The Virginia Synod Assembly is an annual gathering of rostered leaders and elected voting members of congregations that gather together to experience and express what it means to be called to be Church together as the Body of Christ, as we care for necessary items of business, engage in fellowship, participate in and experience corporate worship, and are inspired by the theme and speakers." <u>http://www.vasynod.org/synod-assembly/</u>

This year's assembly was held June 9-11 at Roanoke College, and, on June 11, The Rev. Robert Humphrey, pastor of Muhlenberg in Harrisonburg, was elected to serve a six-year term as bishop. He was elected on the fifth ballot with 217 votes. Following are reports from two St. Stephen representatives who attended, John Harms and Chris Punchard:

SYNOD ASSEMBLY, ROANOKE, VA—John Harms

As one of the Congregation's delegates to the Synod Assembly, I would like to provide my insight on this important meeting that elected a new Bishop for our Virginia Synod. Many saw the results of this election in the yellow insert in the June 18 church program, but other information was provided during this meeting as well as the dynamics involved in the 'brutal' task of electing a Bishop. (**Pastor Andy Ballentine's** observation, with which I agree.)

<u>'Peace Corps,' Lutheran Style</u>: This was a program I had never heard of before, but we have four young ladies (in their twenties) serving a one-year period, assisting remote Lutheran congregations. Two are in the Outback of Australia, one of these living in an Aborigine village. Having visited Australia on maeny occasions, I thought it unique that Christianity, especially as practiced by Lutherans, could ever replace the strong spirit world worship of the Australian aborigines. Another of these ladies is working in Sudan, while another is headed for South Africa.

- <u>Lutheran Mission Growth</u>: I was surprised at the inroads the Lutheran mission programs are making, primarily in Asia. These include a new church in Nepal, churches in Myanmar (Burma), Cambodia, Vietnam and Indonesia— countries with strong Buddhist and Muslim histories.
- <u>The Election of a New Bishop</u>: A unique but 'brutal' process, as I have previously noted. There were about 405 delegates with electoral authority from the 105 Lutheran Churches in our Synod—
 - Ballot One: Since few lay people know pastors from other congregations, people tend to vote for someone they know. Both Pastor Andy and Pastor Cheryl were nominated. This produces about five pages, each with about 40 names of nominations; those nominated have 12 hours to have their names removed, if they do not want to proceed in the process.
 - Ballot Two: With the initial names removed, we are down to one page of about 30 names, and we are to vote for seven of the remaining group. Therefore, voting seems to flow to the persons with the most votes.
 - \geq Ballot Three: One of the pastors nominated in the group of seven who was not present sent an email stating he did not want to run, but his name still had to remain on the ballot. Thus, the remaining six nominees present were given five minutes to explain what they would do if elected as the new Bishop. In my opinion, five gave talks in generalities, while one provided a 'game plan' of what he would do. Since the order of speakers was determined from the order of names drawn from a hat, it appeared that the last two speakers had an advantage. It was evident that all six poured their heart and soul into explaining why they wanted to be the next Bishop. After this, we were to vote for three persons, and the vote was by electronic hand-held devices, not arduous paper ballet counting. The results were quickly known.
 - <u>Ballot Four</u>: Three nominees now remained, and each was asked three questions. One question appeared either poorly fashioned or was a trick question: 'If you were Bishop, prioritize the following—Time, Programs, Family?' Of the three, two prioritized each element, while one realized you cannot separate Time and Programs, since they are integrated as one.

- <u>Ballot Five:</u> No further questions were asked of the two remaining nominees, but the voting delegates knew by then for whom they would vote. Ballot five was conducted, and The Rev. Robert Humphrey was elected as our new Bishop.
- The Election Committee provided 'Shepherds' to each of the final six nominees to help people deal with their disappointment of not being selected Bishop. St. Stephen's Larry Shoberg was assigned to Pastor Humphrey, so he had no work to do.

REPORT FROM SYNOD ASSEMBLY—Chris Punchard

First, I would like to thank all of you for allowing me to represent you at the Synod Assembly this year; it was an honor and a privilege. I would like to take this opportunity to share with you some of my personal observations and reflections beyond the highlights you received in the bulletin insert and at the congregational meeting.

- I was surprised how stressful the process of electing a new bishop was! We started out by everyone writing down on a piece of paper anyone you wished to propose as bishop, and each ballot required a different percentage of votes in order for a person to become bishop. It seemed to me that there should have been some names already on the ballot, but, apparently, in allowing the Holy Spirit to guide the process, that is not done. So, on Friday 75 people were nominated, and most of them quickly withdrew their names, including our own two pastors (thank goodness).
- On Saturday morning another ballot was held, with the remaining names numbering about 15. This resulted in narrowing the field to the top 7, who then gave speeches and provided biographical information prior to the early Saturday afternoon ballot. This then narrowed the field to the top 3. All the pastors present assured us that the Holy Spirit was at work. I had a headache that would not quit and a pain in my neck from the tension. The field of 3 was then presented with questions to answer, and a fourth ballot followed late Saturday afternoon, narrowing the field to 2.

- We went back on Sunday morning, and there were several reports, but the last report was from the youth. The president of the youth presented to the assembly thoughts on what they would like to see in the new bishop, and our own Sara Osborn was standing on the stage as part of the youth leadership team. Finally, some words of wisdom, and I was able to vote confidently for a candidate. It was the youth of our church who provided for me the most powerful sense of the Holy Spirit in the process.
- We elected Robert Humphrey, who is currently the pastor at Muhlenberg Lutheran in Harrisonburg. When asked what gifts he would bring to the office of bishop, his answer was 'passion and commitment to Jesus, the Gospel, the church and the World.' He also has a rich background in serving all sizes of congregations, training as a congregational conflict consultant, and he has served on many synod committees. I think for this time in our history as a church, Pastor Humphrey will serve us very well.
- The other meaningful highlights for me were the ٠ banquet in honor of Bishop Mauney's retirement, and the always powerful worship service on Saturday night, with the ordination of Alexander Zuber into the synod as pastor at Stony Man Lutheran Parrish in Lurray, which was very special. Another special time was reconnecting with my former pastor from Connecticut, who now serves in Virginia. Most powerful of all for me personally was seeing Randy's cousin Joyce arrive as the voting member from First English in Richmond. Many of you know that this time last year we were praying for her due to a brain infection, resulting in brain surgery. She had to relearn everything, and here she was a year later walking into the assembly.

So, thank you again. I look forward to the future with our new bishop. Peace to you, **Chris Punchard**




