Celebrating Luther

On October 31, 1517, Martin Luther posted 95 Theses for debate about the Church's practice of selling Indulgences. The theses were intended for debate among members of the theological faculty at the University of Wittenberg, but copies were printed and distributed widely, spreading the controversy. Many historians use this date as the beginning of the Lutheran Reformation.

In 1999, the Lutheran World Federation (which includes our Evangelical Lutheran Church in America) and the Roman Catholic Church issued a statement explaining our convergence over the doctrine of justification. What does this mean? It means that we have come to an agreement of how to understand the fundamental theological reason for the Reformation!

Using this achievement as a basis, in 2017, the Lutheran World Federation and the Roman Catholic Church are commemorating the 500th anniversary of the Reformation together. Where are our convergences? Where is there more work to be done?

This is giving Lutherans an opportunity to return to Luther's fundamental teachings, those that he received from St. Paul in the New Testament: that we are justified through faith; that God has won our salvation through the death and resurrection of Jesus the Christ; that we work to advance God's kingdom in response to that salvation. When the Spirit immerses us in that good news, in that grace, our lives are full of joy!

At St. Stephen, we will engage in activities of worship and study throughout 2017 to observe this 500th anniversary. A theme for the year is: "Where We Were 500 Years Ago, Where We Are Today, Where We Are Going In The Future." I invite you to take part in as many of these events as you can.

I Heard the Bells on Christmas Day

On Christmas Day, we sing the Christmas carol, "I Heard the Bells on Christmas Day." The text was written by the poet Henry Wadsworth Longfellow in 1863, in the midst of the Civil War. It was first published two years later in a journal.

In addition to being a tumultuous period for our country, it was also a dark period in Longfellow's life. Against his father's wishes, Longfellow's oldest son joined the Union army, and Longfellow's second wife died suddenly and tragically in 1861.

In 1872, the poem was set to music, and, although multiple tunes have been used over the years, the one

we use on Christmas Day is the most popular. When this poem appears in a hymnal, there is one verse that is omitted, which reflects the time in which it was written:

Then from each black, accursed mouth
The cannon thundered in the South,
And with the sound
The carols drowned
Of peace on earth, good-will to men!

In addition to containing many essential Christmas themes, this hymn is particularly applicable to our time. The author of the poem is feeling discouraged by the hatred in the world during a time when there should be peace on earth.

Health Ministry:

We Walked to Bethlehem!



We began our journey to Bethlehem on October 2 and traveled a total of 15,406 miles. The first week we started by traveling west, across the United States and to the Pacific, with our first stop on the banks of the Mississippi River in St. Louis. Here we learned about the Native American Mississippians and their earthwork mounds; French explorers Joliet and Marquette and the fur trading post of 1763; the German population establishing the beer brewing industry; and, that it is the home of several religious denominations' seminaries and St. Louis University, a Catholic university.

Our second week found us in Salt Lake City, Utah, founded by Brigham Young and followers of the Church of Jesus Christ of the Latter-day Saints. It is also home to the famous Mormon Tabernacle Choir, and the Great Salt Lake is just west of the city.

Next, we headed to California during week three, where we boarded a cruise ship to Hawaii. There we found warm weather, beautiful beaches, the volcano at Diamond Head, and also learned about Pearl Harbor.

Our next stop, in week four, was at Midway Atoll, known primarily for a major naval battle during World War II. It currently is a national wildlife refuge with only 40-60 inhabitants, all employed in the Fish and Wildlife Service.

In week five we sailed toward Taiwan, passing by Iwo Jima, site of an instrumental World War II battle. Taiwan is part of the Republic of China, which was established in 1912.

Week six brought us to the many islands of the Philippines. The capital, Manila, was founded by Spanish explorers in 1571, and the United States assumed control after the Spanish-American war. The country is largely Roman Catholic, but there are also numerous Protestants, as well as insurgent Muslims.

By week seven we landed in Thailand. Although the elephant is Thailand's national symbol, poaching has drastically reduced the elephant population. The prevalent religion is Theravada Buddhism, which is an integral part of Thai culture and identity.

Week eight found us in Kolkata (Calcutta), the capital of the Indian state of West Bengal, where there is a religiously and ethnically diverse culture that includes Bengali Hindus, Muslims, and Christians.

By week nine we arrived in Kandahar, the second largest city in Afghanistan. Founded in 329 BCA by Alexander the Great, it is rich in ancient history. Prominent in the news in recent years, decades of war have left much of it destroyed, but is being rebuilt.

Week 10 found us in Hamadan, Iran, where Esther and Mordechai are buried. The Bible notes that a scroll was found here, giving the Jews permission from King Darius/Cyrus to rebuild the Temple in Jerusalem.

Week 11 brought us to Bethlehem, just in time to celebrate the birth of Jesus! Over 2,000 years ago Joseph and Mary traveled from Nazareth to Bethlehem to register for the required census.

To fulfill the ancient prophesy, it was there in the "City of David" that Jesus was born. Just as the early travelers followed the Star to find the Newborn King, we have made a symbolic journey to find the Messiah.

Thank you to the "Walk to Bethlehem" committee of Pat Janot, Janice Mayfield, and Tina Wolff for their help in organizing, tracking, and counting our steps to Bethlehem. A great big shout-out to Pat for her creativity in writing the weekly bulletin information of our journey location.

We hope this virtual communal Walk to Bethlehem has been helpful to you both spiritually and physically. Thank you for your participation.

Stephen Ministry, By the Numbers



St. Stephen Lutheran Church has been enrolled as a Stephen Ministry congregation since 1994, for a total of **22 years** of continuous ministry.



Since enrolling in Stephen Ministry, *SSLC* has sent **11 members** to be trained as Stephen Leaders.



Our Stephen Leaders have trained **40** lay Stephen ministers to provide oneon-one Christian care to hurting people in our congregation and community.



Every Stephen Minister undergoes **50 hours** of training covering a variety of topics, including: listening, confidentiality, grief support, depression, crisis theory, and more.



Each Stephen Minister makes a commitment to serve in his or her role for a minimum or **2 years**, but many continue for longer.



This number will be determined by **the number of members** who will feel called to begin Stephen Ministry training. Can we count on you?

A NEW DIRECTION FOR ST. STEPHEN LUTHERAN PRESCHOOL

In November 2016, the St. Stephen Congregation Council endorsed an effort to integrate St. Stephen Lutheran Preschool into the congregation's mission of Faith Formation and Outreach, and to ensure the financial viability of the school.

Over the past several years, Preschool expenses have far exceeded income. In early 2016, the St. Stephen Congregation Council acted to prevent a crisis: that the Preschool would be in a financial deficit at the end of the 2016-2017 school year. At that time, the Congregation Council authorized a Task Group of St. Stephen members to explore the history of the Preschool, assess its current purpose, mission and operations, and offer options for the future.

This past fall, the Task Group's report was finished and widely disseminated. After working extensively with the report, the Council announced that the St. Stephen Lutheran Preschool will continue its ministry, with new leadership coming from within the congregation. The goal is to make possible a closer connection with the congregation's Faith Formation and Outreach programs, while staffing, salaries and expenses are restructured to ensure that expenses will not exceed income.

St. Stephen Lutheran Preschool will continue in the tradition of its current mission statement:

We provide a kind and friendly atmosphere in which each child will expand his/her cognitive, social, physical, and emotional development, focusing on positive self-concept and an enjoyable preschool experience.

Further emphasized and expanded will be the second part of the mission statement:

We introduce preschool members and their families to the St. Stephen congregation and ministry, and invite them to become participants in the study of God's word.

AN ICONIC IMAGE



This iconic image of St. Stephen was drawn by Shirley Fout Miller, circa 1957. The church was simply the octagon—folks entering the front doors would be steps from our worship space. In using this image in our upcoming cookbook, the publishers wanted to have signed permission from the artist before printing—I did some searching for information!

Ms. Miller (pictured) was born on Thanksgiving Day, 1925, in Frederick, Maryland, and went on to "live a long life, with a passion for style, entertaining, and Chardonnay." She had contracted tuberculosis at the age of 12 and spent the next 11 years recovering, in and out of the Maryland State



Sanatorium. During this time, she studied with two prominent artists in Washington, DC, and developed her artistic talent. In addition to this wonderful illustration, she produced a number of pen and ink drawings, including a calendar for Colonial Williamsburg.

When Shirley's husband, Dick, got a job in Richmond, he commuted so that they could live in Williamsburg, a dream of hers. She worked as a secretary in the press bureau for the Colonial Williamsburg Foundation and the Abby Aldrich Rockefeller Folk Art Collection. She died in 2012 at the age of 86 years.

"She was just an almost unfailingly sweet, unfailingly kind and unfailingly sociable person."
