Forwarding Faith

We're beginning a new year – 2018! Doesn't a new year encourage you to look forward to what the new year will bring?

Leaders of our Virginia Synod and our Evangelical Lutheran Church in America are looking forward, with hopefulness and confidence. That's because this is Christ's church, and the Spirit is leading us forward. There is no question that we are facing great challenges (as is true of all Protestant denominations). Fewer people worship weekly. Fewer parents bring their children to worship. Young adults in their 20s and 30s are nearly entirely absent on Sunday mornings. Can we simply continue doing church as we always have? Many of us are paying attention to new forms that the church is taking as mission opportunities arise. Fewer of us are willing to prop up institutional structures simply because "we've always done it that way."

Whatever the church becomes, the Holy Spirit is leading us forward, and faith formation will be at the center of what we do. The purpose of the Virginia Synod's youth and faith formation ministries is to offer support to what we do in our congregations. I want to make you aware of a three-year capital funds appeal which will endow those Synodical ministries into the future. The appeal is called "Forwarding Faith."

Currently the Virginia Synod's programs of faith formation include the youth events "7<sup>th</sup> Day" (for 5<sup>th</sup> and 6<sup>th</sup> graders), "Lost and Found" (for 7<sup>th</sup> and 8<sup>th</sup> graders), "Winter Celebration" and "Kairos" (for high school youth). All of these bring together hundreds of

youth from around the Synod. For adults, the Synod brings in individuals with great expertise to lead studies of Bible, theology, and faith practices. The current offerings are the "Ambassadors Community for Theological Study" (ACTS), which offers two seminarylevel courses each year, and the annual convocationeducational event, "Power in the Spirit." Many members of St. Stephen have participated in these events for youth and adults, which are only possible because we and the other congregations in the Synod send mission support to fund the necessary staffing!

What programs of faith formation will our Synod's leaders envision, as the Spirit leads us into the next generation? One thing is for sure: there will always be the need for financial support. That is why the Congregation Council of St. Stephen voted to participate in Forwarding Faith. Forwarding Faith will create an endowment that will fund the Synod's programs of youth ministry and faith formation. Already, just over \$2.5 million has been pledged to Forwarding Faith, which is nearly enough to fund current program levels into perpetuity! (Both Pastor Griffin and I have pledged, as has every other active pastor in the Synod – a remarkable response!)

Last April, when our Congregation Council voted to participate, Council members set a goal for our congregation of \$50,000 in pledges and gifts over the next three years. Tim and Evon Crittenden are coordinating the appeal in our congregation. You'll be hearing a lot about Forwarding Faith during the first five weeks of 2018, as we lift up the opportunity for you to respond!

There will be winter-themed refreshments, games, face painting, and a cake walk. "Working the shelter changes your life," said one of our shelter workers this past Sunday. You see, your perspective changes after spending time with people who have next to nothing and are grateful for a smile, a conversation, or a hot meal.

St. Stephen is blessed to be able to help those coming to the Community of Faith Mission for a brief respite each night:

- We are blessed and humbled to sit and have a conversation that might not make much sense to us, but the shelter guest really wants to tell you his story.
- We are blessed and humbled when a shelter guest is leaving in the morning and tells <u>US</u> to have a good day.
- We are blessed and humbled when a shelter guest tells us how much she enjoyed the meal, then asking shyly what will be served at the next meal - not taking that next meal for granted.
- We are blessed and humbled to provide clean underwear and socks; socks that sometimes have to be crowded into too-small shoes. The shoes may be too small, making it difficult to walk, but they will keep the rain and snow off his feet.
- We are blessed and humbled as we rush from our warm homes to our warm cars to pick up an ingredient for dinner at the supermarket – remembering the guests who are standing patiently outside in the snow, waiting for the shelter to open for the evening.

We faced new challenges during this year of service.

 When preparing our first dinner on Sunday night, we discovered that one of the ovens in our kitchen did not work. A faithful worker, who was not scheduled that evening, came in and took the main course to her home to heat and delivered it to the Methodist Church in time for dinner.

- We ran out of food one evening and came back to the church to make sandwiches for those who came in after the hot meal was gone. Imagine 10 lbs. of meatloaf, 10 lbs. of mashed potatoes, 6 lbs. of corn, a relish tray and 35 rolls being eaten in 35 minutes! The guests were as grateful for the cold sandwiches as they were for the hot meal.
- The oven issue caused another problem on Wednesday, so one of our intrepid workers took the 5 lb. tub of cookie dough home to bake for that evening's dessert. She then came in to work a regular shift of meal preparation.

All in all, the face of Jesus is seen in all those who served and those whom we served – young and old, men and women, white and black. There is no distinction – all are children of God.

Thank you all for your help and prayers for this year's December week of the Community of Faith Mission as we served with King of Glory Lutheran and Williamsburg United Methodist Churches. We will again serve a week in February (18-25) with the Williamsburg Church of Christ on Merrimac Trail. Jo Hanny, Queen of the schedulers, will be asking for your help soon.

When one volunteers for the shelter, perspectives change. Whether it rains or snows, is hot or cold, we no longer take basic comforts for granted but instead recall how the elements cause logistical and physical difficulties for those without a permanent home.

I thank God for this change in me.
