2020 VISION

Wow! 2019 seemed to go by in a flash! Can you believe it is the year 2020? Every time I hear "2020," I think of the measurement of vision as perfect! You can see clearly from 20 feet away what you should see. Sometimes seeing things accurately is challenging! Paying attention helps.

The wise men, we are not told how many, had been waiting for a king to come into the world. They were looking for the coming of the king when they saw a bright star that they knew was a sign from God, and used it to guide them to where the baby Jesus lay in the manger. This event is celebrated on Epiphany, which means "manifestation," on January 6. This story is told in Matthew 2:1-12.

What we see depends on what we are searching for. Are you looking for signs of God? Where you see love and forgiveness is where you will find God. Love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, generosity, faithfulness, gentleness and self-control are the fruits of the Spirit, the gifts that God gives (Galatians 5:22-23). When you find these, you have found God. Do you recognize the divine spark in yourself? In others? Do you look for the good in people?

The Eighth Commandment states: You shall not bear false witness against your neighbor. Luther explains that this commandment also means that we are to come to our neighbor's defense, speak well of them, and interpret everything they do in the best possible light. This does not mean that we have to agree with them; it means we need to be kind. Sometimes being kind requires strength and courage. Kindness is both teachable, and contagious! Science has found that it is also good for your health. (I don't know about you, but I always feel better when I am kind.) Want to stay young? Perpetually kind people age slower than the average person. That may be because they have 23% less cortisol (the stress hormone) and age slower than the average population!

Acts of kindness produce endorphins. Endorphins are the brain's natural pain killer. Do you know what is the most important indicator of satisfaction and stability in a marriage? Kindness. Giving to others, rather than buying more and more for ourselves, produces long lasting well-being. It's good for your heart, prevents illness, and reduces stress.

## CONGREGATION COUNCIL



The Congregation Council met on December 10. Present at the meeting were **Pastor Griffin, Bob Achenbach, David** 

Allen, Amy Bergh, Ellie Bergh, Sandy Croushore, Jane de Solms, Jeanne Garrison, Linda Hite, Doug Moore, George Vonderheide, Carol Wiers and David Wills. The following items were discussed and/or approved:

- The Congregational Annual meeting will be held on Sunday, February 2, 2020, following the 11:00 service.
- The 2020 budget was presented to the Council. The budget will be presented at the congregational meeting in February.

- The Security Review committee met to discuss the security of the church building. Once completed, their report will be presented to the Council and then to the congregation.
- The Model Constitution for Congregations of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America 2019 is currently being reviewed. Any possible amendments to the St. Stephen constitution will be presented at the Congregational Meeting in February.
- The Virginia Synod is offering a new opportunity for inspiration, learning and growth. Effective Practice for Innovation Congregations (EPIC) is a one day conference that will be open to all interested members of the congregation. More information about the conference will be announced soon.
- The Council approved a contract for the painting of much of the interior of the church.
- The parking loop around the church will be repaved in the Spring. Dates that the parking loop will be closed will be announced.
- A cipher lock will be installed on the exterior door adjacent to the Preschool and College rooms. The combination will be the same as the one on the existing lock near the church office.
- Three middle school Youth attended the 7<sup>th</sup> Day Retreat. It was reported that a good and inspirational time was had by all!





## THE CHURCH MOUSE HEARS

... that **Reed & Karen Nester** finished teaching another session of the Norge Elementary School Bike Club, assisted by Andy Ballentine and club sponsor Lynn Miller. The Bike Club curriculum covers bicycle safety and bicycle handling skills. This is one of the afterschool clubs sponsored by SHIP (Student Health Initiative Program).





Each year we serve in the Community of Faith Shelter I pray to find the words to convey the impact that our ministry has on those with no permanent home who come to the shelter for assistance.

#### So, how were you Jesus this year?

"Not me! I just contributed some money,"

"Not me! I just bought some socks,"

"Not me! You needed coffee, so I just brought some in."

"Not me! I just checked people in for the night"

"Not me! I just helped cook a meal."

"Not me! I only stayed for a half-night shift."

Yes, you! The effect that your smiling, welcoming face, warm socks, or healthy food has on a person who has no home is tremendous. Often, what we would consider insignificant actions, are monumental to those on the receiving end.

I'll call them Ben and Gail – a married couple staying at the shelter. Ben has gout – and so could not eat pork or beef. I learned this at our meatloaf dinner night. For breakfast we had prepared bacon and eggs. The following night we were making baked ham, followed by sausage biscuits on our final morning. Trying to be helpful, I asked Gail if Ben could eat chicken. When she answered yes, I told her that I would make chicken for him the next night. "Really?" she said with tears in her eyes. "You would do that?" Of course! It would really be a simple thing to bake some chicken along with the ham.

Ben came up and asked, "Are you really going to make me chicken tomorrow night?" He explained that he had spent five days in the hospital for gout and was trying to be careful about what he ate. I assured him that there would be food for him the next night and the next morning we made breakfast – turkey sausage! I got a phone call the next afternoon from the shelter -Ben had to work a double shift and would not be able to get there that night. We arranged that I would make the chicken and put it in the refrigerator with his name on it for when he was able to get there.

I was surprised to see him that evening – he got out of the second shift so that he could come to the shelter to eat the chicken we made for him. In my head it was "just baked chicken." To Ben, it was a wonderful gift of food that he was able to eat.

"For I was hungry and you gave me food, I was thirsty and you gave me something to drink, I was a stranger and you welcomed me, I was naked and you gave me clothing, I was sick and you took care of me, I was in prison and you visited me." ... "Lord, when was it that we saw you hungry and gave you food, or thirsty and gave you something to drink? And when was it that we saw you a stranger and welcomed you, or naked and gave you clothing? And when was it that we saw you sick or in prison and visited you?"... "Truly I tell you, just as you did it to one of the least of these, my brothers and sisters, you did it to me.' (Matthew 25:35-40)

The number of workers from St. Stephen who came out to physically assist in the shelter exceeds 40 people. The number of people from St. Stephen who prayed for us, contributed cash, coffee, socks, underwear, snack crackers, paper towels, juice, etc. is innumerable. All of us help as we are able and all gifts of time, talent, and funding are so very appreciated.
