How's it going, here, during Ordinary Time?

For you and me who are living in the liturgical world, there are two portions of Ordinary Time. A short period comes during the season of Epiphany (between Christmas and Lent). Now we're in the longer portion, which comprises about half the year. It started on June 11 this year, and it will extend until the First Sunday of Advent, December 3 this year. ("Ordinary" probably comes from the word, "ordinal": the Sundays after the Epiphany and after Pentecost are numbered.)

Even though the liturgical year causes some folks' heads to spin, here's why it's such a great gift from God. It's because it helps us stay alert to what God is doing! The themes of the liturgical seasons make us aware of God's presence, in what we experience, in our day-to-day lives.

You know those times of preparation — when you are hopeful, when you are waiting and expecting? Well, those are the themes of the season of Advent, which begins the liturgical year. We celebrate during Christmas! Then we move into Epiphany: What does it mean that God has been born into our human flesh? We enter into the season of Lent. How often have you discovered anew that you must die to your illusion that you are the center of your own little universe? That's a chief theme of Lent, as we return to our baptisms into the death and resurrection of Christ. We celebrate the resurrection every Sunday, but particularly so during the seven weeks of the Easter season.

When you pay attention to the themes of each liturgical season during your daily prayer, you become aware that there's more to our lives than a mindless progression of "the same old same old," day after day. What is God up to? Let's use these liturgical themes. What is God doing in your life when you're experiencing times of preparation and hope? Or of celebration? Or of needing to die to your inflated ego? How do you experience God in your human flesh? How does Christ's resurrection give you hope?

We are into the six-month-long season of Ordinary Time, which reminds us that God gives us growth, incrementally (and even imperceptibly if we're not alert and watching for it), during the routine periods of our lives.

How do you stay alert and watching for this? Let me suggest one practice of prayer. It's called a daily examen. It's rooted in the teaching of St. Ignatius of Loyola, who founded the Jesuit order in the Roman Catholic Church. There are many versions of the daily examen. I have taken one and adapted it, with four movements:

I. Transition

 I make the transition from the activities of this day into this exercise, aware of how much God loves me.

II. Thanksgiving

- What has given me consolation? How has God stirred my heart and thoughts on this day?
- When have I given and received love?
- What am I grateful for in this day?

III. Forgiveness

- What has caused desolation? What thoughts and actions have not been from God?
- When was I resentful or angry?
- When was a fearful?
- When was I impatient, feeling time anxiety?
- When did I feel it was all up to me? When was I self-reliant to a fault?
- What do I need to let go of from this day?


IV. Transition

- I ask for the healing touch of the forgiving and loving God who removes my heart's burdens.
- I look towards the rest of this day or to tomorrow and pray to live it in accord with God's loving desire in my life.

Often it helps to journal what you hear in this type of prayer. Usually, over the weeks and weeks of Ordinary Time, you become aware of how God is giving you growth, incrementally.



Robert Humphrey Elected Bishop of ELCA Virginia Synod



The Rev. Robert Humphrey, Harrisonburg, Virginia, was elected June 11 to a six-year term as bishop of the Virginia Synod of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA). The election was held during the Synod Assembly June 9-11 at Roanoke College in Salem, Virginia.

Humphrey was elected on the fifth ballot with 217 votes to 167 votes for The Rev. Kelly Bayer Derrick, associate pastor of St. Philip Lutheran Church of Roanoke, Virginia.

Humphrey has served as pastor of Muhlenberg Lutheran Church since 2010.

The bishop-elect earned a Bachelor of Arts from the from the University of Richmond in Richmond, Virginia in 1977. He received his Master of Divinity from Lutheran Theological Southern Seminary in 1981.

The Rev. James F. Mauney, current bishop of the ELCA Virginia Synod, has served as bishop since 1999 and will retire Aug. 31.

Humphrey will be installed as bishop on September 9 at First Presbyterian Church in Waynesboro, Virginia.

2017 Virginia Synod Assembly Update Forwarding Faith

Synod Assembly is our annual opportunity for the 150 congregations of the Virginia Synod to come together and be reminded what it means to be a part of the wider church. Our theme during our June 9-11, 2017 gathering was "Ambassadors for Christ: Forwarding Faith".

During the weekend, **The Rev. Rafael Malpica Padilla**, the Executive Director of the Global Mission program, represented the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America, bringing good news from the wider church.

The Rev. Malpica Padilla, also served as election representative for the Virginia Synod Bishop Election. The Rev. Robert Humphrey pastor of Muhlenberg in Harrisonburg was elected on June 11th to serve a sixyear term as bishop. Humphrey was elected on the fifth ballot with 217 votes to 167 votes for The Rev. Kelly Bayer Derrick, associate pastor of St. Philip Lutheran Church of Roanoke.

Testimonials from campaign leadership, **Stephanie Hamlett** of Epiphany Richmond, **The Rev. Jean Bozeman** of First Lutheran in Norfolk, **Jonathan Hornbaker** of Grace in Winchester, and Bishop James F. Mauney were given in support of the ForwardingFaith campaign and the many ministries this endowment aims to support. The campaign has raised over \$2.2 million thus far. The congregational phase is when we welcome and provide the opportunity for our congregations to come together and support faith formation in the Virginia Synod.

One resolution was passed with a standing ovation, recognizing the great work in the life of our synod by Bishop Mauney, naming him Bishop Emeritus at his retirement on August $31^{\rm st}$.

Elections for Synod Council also took place over the weekend. We welcome newly elected lay member Judy Casteele of Good Shepherd in Lexington. The Rev. Paul

Pingel pastor of Grace Waynesboro was elected to continue his appointment to serve. **The Rev. Meredith Williams**, pastor of Ascension Lutheran in Danville, **The Rev. Kelly Bayer Derrick**, **The Rev. Chris Carr** pastor of Christ the King in Richmond were all reelected to serve as Ministers of Word and Sacrament on Synod Council.

The Committee of Discipline and the Consultation Committee were also elected over the weekend. Both were elected by acclamation.

The Rev. Alex Zuber was ordained into the ministry of Word and Sacrament in the ELCA during Saturday evening liturgy at St. Andrew's in Roanoke. He will serve as pastor in the Stony Man Lutheran Parish made up of Beth Eden and Grace Lutheran in Luray, Virginia.

One young woman was commissioned for Young Adults in Global Mission. **Samantha DiBiaso** of First Lutheran in Norfolk has accepted a one-year appointment as a YAGM to Southern Africa.

Michaela Loving of Mt. Zion in New Market, president of the Lutheran Youth Organization, presented the Youth Assembly report, centered on the Youth Assembly theme of "To Faith and Beyond". She spoke to the immeasurable value of youth events, and also expressed the gathered youths' vision for the new bishop of the Virginia Synod. The next LYO Board president will be Isaac Wilson of Christ Lutheran in Fredericksburg.
