Dying So We Can Live: The Lenten Journey

Have you ever had this experience: you buy a book and you begin to read it, but you stop part-way through because it just isn't keeping your attention? But I wonder if you have also had this experience: that you pull down that same book, perhaps years later, and it is the book you are *meant to be reading* at this moment!

That's happened to me in recent weeks, with a book by Cynthia Bourgeault featuring this intimidating title: Centering Prayer and Inner Awakening. The book includes a diagram titled "The False Self in Action." Bourgeault helps the reader identify how formative experiences in childhood or youth often encourage us to become trapped in a need for "security and survival," or a need for "power and control," or a need for "esteem and affection" from others. All of these are signs of our false selves in action. Our false selves are driven by our egos, so concerned with image and performance. Our false selves are teeming with compulsions which block us from letting go, from receiving grace from God, from perceiving what God is doing and creating.

We are into our Lenten journey to Good Friday and Easter. To use baptismal language (which is Lenten language): we are joined to Jesus' death and resurrection. It is only in dying that we can live. With God's help and empowerment, we need to die to our false selves so we can live as our true selves: the joyous people that God wants us to be.

The annual Lenten journey encourages us to practice disciplines that will enable this dying and living.

What does that look like for you, during this season of Lent? What is your attachment, or even your addiction to safety, and your aversion to risk, that your false self keeps telling you you must maintain? Or, what is your attachment to control, and your aversion letting go? Or, what is your addiction to worrying about what others think, and your aversion to being who you actually are, the person God has created you to be?

What is damaging your relationships with others, because you are acting out of your ego-driven false self? What are you projecting upon others, from your own hurts and compulsions and anxieties? What are your inaccurate assumptions and expectations and predispositions that prevent you from seeing and hearing what God is doing?

How do you need to die to yourself, so you can live before God in the joy God desires for us?

We have a month to go in this season of Lent. Use these weeks to lift up the compulsions of your false self in your prayer. Listen to practices that might engage in, to welcome grace and joy into your daily life.

This is a high level of spiritual practice! Would you like to talk with me about any of this, to bounce around ideas of what this might look like on your journey? I would be highly honored.

The Divine Dance by Richard Rohr

My next book study will be of *The Divine Dance: The Trinity and Your Transformation*.

I was thinking of using this book a year ago, leading up to Trinity Sunday, but we were into Luther's writings at the time. I nearly forgot about this book until my 89-year old mother said, this past Christmas, "That's the best book I've ever read on the Trinity!"

Richard Rohr is a Franciscan priest, considered a renegade by more orthodox Catholics, but a writer that I find to be deeply helpful. As traditional forms of the church decline, Fr. Rohr is envisioning what Christianity is becoming, how God is re-forming the faith and the church.

Here's an idea of how Fr. Rohr enlivens our imaginations about the mystery of God as Trinity:

"Remember, mystery isn't something that you cannot understand – it is something that you can endlessly understand! There is no point at which can say, 'I've got it.' Always and forever, mystery gets you! ...

"Whatever is going on in God is a *flow*, a *radical* relatedness, a perfect communion between Three – a circle dance of love. And God is not just a dancer; God is the dance itself. ...

"At the heart of Christian revelation, God is not seen as a distant, static monarch but — as we will explore together — a divine circle dance, as the early Fathers of the church dared to call it (in Greek perichoresis, the origin of our word choreography). God is the Holy One 'presenced' in the dynamic and loving action of Three."

The five-session study begins **Monday, April 23**. (If there are enough who sign up, Thursday afternoons will be offered as well, beginning April 26.)

Want to join this adventurous exploration into who God is? Let me know! Each copy of the book will cost \$13.50. The deadline for ordering is April 1, Easter Sunday.

Providing Space in St. Stephen's Building for Recovery and Support Groups

One aspect of our congregation's long legacy of outreach to the community is providing space in our building for recovery and support groups. Currently, we provide space for:

- Three Alcoholics Anonymous groups where individuals support each other in resisting and recovering from addiction to alcohol.
- Two Al Anon groups, in which family members of addicts guide each other in keeping their loved ones on the path of recovery.
- The Williamsburg gathering of the National Alliance for Mental Illness, in which individuals who suffer from mental illness and their family members give support each other as they navigate day-to-day life.

In all of these groups, most of those who gather are members of the community. However, in all of these groups, members of our congregation are participating or have participated.

The reason why we provide space to such groups, simply put, is because Jesus would want us to. The Spirit calls us together as a congregation so that we can be Jesus for those in need. We are obeying what God commands when we provide hospitality to those who are in need. There are hundreds of passages in both the Old and New Testaments, as well as the words and actions of Jesus that call us to take the risk to open ourselves to those in need — teaching us that, if we do not show such love to others, we do not love God. Our purpose in our community is to provide love and hospitality

From time to time we revisit the balance of providing hospitality while at the same time maintaining a reasonable degree of questions of safety and security in our building. For instance, a couple of months ago, our defibrillator went missing! (Fortunately, the groups that meet in our building contributed just over \$2,000 in offerings during their meetings in 2017, more than enough to cover the cost of this loss.) Over the years, our relationship with the recovery and support groups has been very good. The groups' members are so

thankful for the space that is available here at St. Stephen, and offer assistance if we need it. For instance, the most recent time the Fellowship Hall walls were painted, it was done by several members of one of the groups. Other group members have purchased plastic "feet" to replace those that were broken on our folding chairs. Last month, two members of the mental illness support group even gave St. Stephen \$5,000 towards our ministries with the homeless! Often mental illness is involved when a person is homeless.

Of course, we don't offer space in our building hoping for a payback! Instead, it is because God gives us this opportunity for the ministry of hospitality. We can be thankful that we have the privilege of providing rooms for these recovery and support groups to meet, so that God can save lives in our building, every night of the week.

Health Ministry and the Parish Nurse/ Faith Community Nurse Program

A Brief History

Rev. Dr. Granger E. Westberg, a Lutheran minister, founded the Parish Nurse program 34 years ago in 1984. Today, Parish Nursing is called by the more inclusive name — Faith Community Nursing — and is a world-wide inter-denominational program.

Westberg held a joint appointment in medicine and theology at the University of Chicago. He was a pioneer in exploring and encouraging the interrelationship of religion and medicine, and in fostering holistic health care. He recognized the church's role in promoting health, and that it is the only human institution in our society that interacts with individuals from birth through death.

He launched the Program so that *nurses* and others in congregations working together could use their talents to promote health, prevent illness, and care for those in need. His book "Good Grief" is well known.

Faith Community Nursing (Parish Nursing)

Faith Community Nursing (FCN) is rooted in a faith community and extends God's healing and compassion to those in need. It is recognized as a specialty practice by the American Nurses Association (ANA) and functions under the guidelines of the *Scope and Standard of Faith Community Nursing Practice (2016)*.

An FCN seeks to foster physical, emotional, spiritual, and social harmony leading to healthy and healing relationships with God, family, and faith communities. The FCN supports the healing mission of the church, and works to promote an understanding of the relationship between lifestyle, faith and wellbeing.

Faith Community Nurse

The Faith Community Nurse (Parish Nurse) is a registered nurse (R.N.) who has successfully completed the 40 hour FCN course. Faith Community Nurses perform different services, based on the congregation's

needs. These services may include any or all of the following:

- <u>Educator</u>: Providing health information in articles, and church bulletins, providing educational programs or classes (CPR, etc), assessing the educational needs of the congregation.
- <u>Liaison</u> to the Community, providing resources and referrals.
- Health Advocate: Visiting with congregation members in their home, hospital or health care and extended care facilities; accompanying members to physical appointments or when investigating long term care.
- Health Counselor: Meeting 1:1 to discuss health issues, concerns, and address emotional, and spiritual needs. Providing blood pressure screening and health information educational materials.

<u>St. Stephen's Health Ministry Mission Statement</u> (2011)

"The Health Ministry of St. Stephen Lutheran Church serves to advocate for the physical, emotional and spiritual health among members of our congregation. The ministry seeks to follow the example of Jesus Christ as he ministered to the sick and suffering." Health ministry is an approach to wholeness and health that builds on strengths of the congregation & community. It stresses wellness, health promotion, and disease prevention, by including congregational support & community resources.
