This past December 4 was my  $65^{th}$  birthday. April 1 was the  $18^{th}$  anniversary of my arrival at St. Stephen as Pastor. I have just led a congregation through Lent and Easter for the  $40^{th}$  consecutive year. July 7 will be the  $40^{th}$  anniversary of my ordination.

Those last three dates, in particular, indicate unusual longevity in parish ministry. My 18 years with you have been a period of remarkable fruitfulness, for us as a congregation and for me as a person and a pastor. However, I am becoming increasingly aware that I do not have the energy or resiliency for the work as I did in earlier years. If I would hang on, I would be performing with diminishing effectiveness, and that would not serve well this congregation I love so much. I am writing to tell you that I will retire, effective August 1.

I am hoping this early announcement will give Pastor Griffin and our congregation's leaders plenty of time to prepare for an interim period, identifying needs that will exist and how to meet them. I will be as helpful as I can be. I look forward to spending the coming weeks and months preparing for preaching and worship leadership, being present for our College students as they finish this semester, continuing to work with children and their parents on Sunday mornings and in our Preschool and, perhaps most importantly, being present to you in conversation.

#### Transition Q/As

In the months to come, I plan to publish "Transition Q/As" with your questions and with answers to those questions. Here are questions I have heard and anticipate:

- Q: Does this mean Pastor Griffin has to leave?
- A: No! When the congregation called Pastor Griffin in 2014, she was called as Pastor. Her call is independent of mine.
- Q: Who will help the congregation during the interim period?
- A: Virginia Synod Bishop Robert Humphrey and his staff will be providing support and guidance. Assistant to the Bishop Kelly Bayer Derrick has already made an appointment to meet with Pastor Griffin and me. In addition, Pastor Griffin has scheduled a leadership retreat for September 14. At that event, Assistant to the Bishop John Wertz will help the congregation's leaders "assess where we are, where would like to be, and how to get there."
- Q: How long will the interim period be?
- A: The first answer is that it is impossible to say. However, when a pastor has been in place for a long period of time, it is best for the interim period to be a long one. That allows for a period of healthy leave-taking, followed by a period of studying St. Stephen's current needs, envisioning opportunities for future ministries, and coming to a consensus on staffing needs for those opportunities. If the decision is made to call another pastor, there will then be a period of interviewing and prayerfully considering candidates who will be open to a call to St. Stephen.
- Q: Will an Interim Pastor be available to work with Pastor Griffin in the short term?
- A: An Interim Pastor is one possibility, but that is to be determined, with help from the Bishop's office.
- Q: Will you and Patty stay in Williamsburg?
- A: Yes.

- Q: Will you and Patty still be involved in the congregation after August 1?
- A: Evangelical Lutheran Church in America guidelines specify that a retired pastor and spouse not continue as members of the congregation that the pastor served. This is the best way to guard against role confusion and to provide space for an eventual successor to be himself or herself! Patty and I will join another congregation.

In all of this, please remember that the future belongs to the God who richly blesses us.

## STEPHEN MINISTRY AT ST. STEPHEN



This year we celebrate 25 consecutive years of Stephen Ministry here at St. Stephen. During this time St. Stephen has trained and commissioned approximately 79 Stephen Ministers. This is quite a record of caring and comfort to the afflicted.

A Stephen Minister is a lay person who has been trained to provide one to one confidential Christian care to people who are hurting. Potential care receivers include those faced with a particular life crisis including: loss of a loved one, hospitalization, divorce, retirement, unemployment, medical crisis, losses related to aging, recovery from an accident and other major changes.

We encourage everyone to learn more about Stephen Ministry by speaking with our Stephen Leaders or any of our past or present Stephen Ministers. We encourage anyone experiencing a life crisis to request a Stephen Minister from **Pastor Griffin** or **Pastor Ballentine**, and we encourage anyone who feels called to our ministry to speak with **Jane Wills**, our Stephen Leader or **Bill Dichtel**, our soon to be new Stephen Leader regarding training.

On **Sunday June 2**, we will celebrate the commission of three new Stephen Ministers: **Alison Carney**, **Pete Davis** and **Kathy Skube**; as well as our soon-to-be Stephen Leader **Bill Dichtel**. We pray God's blessing on them as they embark on this very special path of Christian caring and comfort for those in need.

Fast-moving, vivid in its details, and at times even funny, Mark shows Jesus at his most human. It focuses on his relationship with his disciples and his obedience to God.

## WARM WEATHER REMINDERS

Warmer weather means summer is on the way. It is so much fun to be outside with friends. Time gets away from us before we know what has happened. As a nurse, I always want to remind people of ways to stay healthy in summer.

- 1. Drink plenty of fluids when it is hot. Water is the preferred drink. Alcoholic beverages, carbonated drinks, sugary drinks, and caffeinated drinks can contribute to dehydration when temperatures are high.
- 2. Avoid being outside in the hottest part of the day. If you are required to be outside, seek shade for a few minutes every hour.
- 3. Wear loose, breathable clothes. Long sleeves are best for sun protection.
- 4. Wear sunscreen even when it is cloudy. SPF 30 is the recommended for adults and SPF 50 for children. Reapply hourly if you are sweating or in the water to maintain a safe level of protection.
- 5. Be aware that children and pets may be more susceptible to heat than adults. Use caution when putting them in hot cars as buckles and metal objects may be very hot. Also use caution when walking on hard surfaces as they get hot and stay hot longer.

If you experience symptoms of heat exhaustion (increased pulse rate, dizziness, fatigue, muscle cramps, headache, nausea, and/or cool moist skin with goose bumps) seek medical attention immediately. If untreated heat exhaustion can lead to heat stroke, which is deadly.
