BLESSINGS

What is the first thing you did when you woke up this morning? Think about it... Did you say that you opened your eyes, or maybe something you do before that? We tend to forget small details, or maybe even not notice them. Isn't opening your eyes in the morning something for which to give thanks? This is my observation and my own experience—we take many simple things for granted, things that are a gift from God. We breathe without thinking about it, until breathing becomes difficult. Our ability to choose what we eat, or what clothes we wear is a blessing on top of having something to wear and food to eat. As challenging as it is to recognizing our blessings, it is important to do.

St. Paul, in his letter to the Colossians, writes, Be thankful. Let the word of Christ dwell in you richly; teach and admonish one another in all wisdom; and with gratitude in your hearts sing psalms, hymns, and spiritual songs to God [15b-16]. Gratitude is a spiritual discipline. Spiritual disciplines draw us closer and open us up to God. They also help us to be who God created us to be, which is the basis of happiness. A grateful disposition is foundational to our well-being.

A grateful nature fends off our attitude of entitlement. It fends off attitudes of entitlement, and holds envy and resentment at bay. Medical science has proven that thankfulness results in better sleep, improves self-esteem, and contributes to physical health. My advice to people is to keep a gratitude journal. At the end of each day, write down three things for which you are thankful.

This leads us back to the beginning. How do we recognize our blessings? I am reminded of a story (written by Jullian Kay Melchior and published in the Wall Street Journal). A young girl, age 7, was obsessed with the thought that there was treasure buried on the school playground. She told her classmates that they would be fools not to look for it. She and her classmates dug every day. As time went on, fewer classmates engaged in the search until finally the young girl was on her own. One day, she heard a "clink" when she turned the earth. There was treasure! Jewels and coins! She would later find that her parents had planted the glass jewels and fake gold coins. Now a young woman, she says that she knew that if she looked for treasure, she would find it.

What is it that you look for? Do you expect to find God's blessings? Do you expect to see Jesus? Dig through your life every day, and give thanks. *Seek and you will find*, Jesus tells us. Thanks be to God!

STEPHEN MINISTRY AT ST. STEPHEN



CARING FOR CAREGIVERS AT HOME

In our congregation, a number of individuals serve as caregivers at home for other family members for extended illnesses, permanent disabilities, mental incapacity or other debilitating problems. Some of these responsibilities are temporary but some are for extended periods or even life-long. The work involved may be limited. On the other hand, the responsibilities can be demanding, even daunting. Not only may the ill family member be homebound, but the care-taker may become essentially home-bound as well. The caregiver may harbor feelings of isolation, fatigue, frustration, anger, guilt, resentment, and/or defeat. Separation from the church community can compound these feelings, just at a time when that support may be most important.

If you are a home caretaker of a family member with a disability or illness and are dealing with some of these issues, you could be helped by a Stephen Minister. Stephen Ministers are members of our congregation who have made a strong personal commitment and gone through extensive training in providing supportive Christian care to those going through stressful times in their lives. Stephen Ministry care can continue over extended periods of time. Stephen Ministers can be particularly helpful to at-home caregivers going through difficulties. Stephen Ministers can come to the home to meet with home caregivers so the home caregiver would still be available to the home bound family member. Meetings are typically once a week and would continue as long as they are beneficial.



GIVING OPTION - REQUIRED MINIMUM DISTRIBUTION

As we are approaching the end of 2019, the decision was made by the Finance Committee to use the date of Sunday, December 29, 2019 as the last day to receive donations to St. Stephen for 2019.



If you are over 70½ and have an IRA, you are required to take a yearly Required Minimum Distribution (RMD) which is treated for tax purposes as regular income. You

have the option of contributing part or all of your RMD to any tax exempt organization. This contribution is called a QCD or Qualified Charitable Distribution and must go directly from the financial institution that holds your IRA to the charity. It counts as your RMD, you do not count it as regular income, but you cannot claim the donation as a charitable contribution.

In the past during the last quarter of the year, many IRA donations have been given to St. Stephen. Please ask your financial advisor to prepare the paperwork indicating your name on the check or check stub, reference QCD or IRA, designate 2019 or 2020, and forward your contribution to the church office no later than the second week in December.

If you give a QCD to St. Stephen, you can earmark the donation for Current Giving, the Building Fund, Endowment Fund or any special ministry that is important to you; such as, Godparents for Tanzania, Homeless Ministry, Campus Ministry, Preschool, etc.

REVERSE ADVENT CALENDAR



DVENy With a "normal" **Advent calendar**, you open a door each day to see a picture, take out a chocolate or get some other prize. With a reverse advent calendar, you begin with an empty cardboard box. Every day for

24 days, beginning December 1 (the first day of Advent), you add one item. After 24 days, at the end of the Advent season, when the box is full, we will collect them and donate them to FISH, our local food pantry.

The Social Ministries Coordinating Committee is asking church members to join with our Preschool families to promote this easy way of giving to the community.

Not only is this a fun thing for the whole family to do together - picking the items to go into the box - more meaningfully, it teaches children (and adults) the importance of helping others, especially at Christmas time.

CAREGIVING

November is National Caregivers month. This is a way to raise awareness of family caregiver issues, celebrate the efforts of family caregivers, educate family caregivers about self-identification and increase support for family caregivers. Over half of the people who care for someone at home are women with more than 1 million young adults over the age of 18 being very active in caring for someone at home. Some of the difficulties faced may include holding down a job, long distance caregiving, friction in the family, the type of disability and even your own feelings.

Transportation can become an issue as our elders age and have to give up driving. It can be difficult to help them navigate their loss of independence and to know when it is time to get help. It is even difficult to find help or know where to start when looking for an agency. In the transition, the caregiver sometimes loses their ability or desire to care for themselves.

Some tips to help take care of yourself:

- 1. Seek support from other caregivers.
- 2. Take care of your own health.
- 3. Accept offers of help.
- 4. Watch for signs of depression.
- 5. Be open to new technologies that can help you.
- 6. Watch for signs of depression
- 7. Communicate effectively
- 8. Organize medical information
- 9. Make sure legal documents are in order
- 10. Give yourself credit for doing the best you can.

If you find you are in need of help, give me a call. I can help you navigate any processes about which you feel you are unsure. My door is open.

VISIONING SESSION

On September 14, 2019, Pastor John Wertz, Assistant to the Bishop, Virginia Synod, conducted an all-day Workshop with the congregation.

Stories Help with Perspective

Pastor Wertz opened this day of visioning at St. Stephen in terms of stories: What are our stories and what do our stories say about who we are, where we've been and where we might be headed?

Beginning the visioning session with a devotion, Pastor Wertz shared the Bible story that we know as the story of the prodigal son. Through his reading of this story in the Gospel (Luke 15:11-32), we come to see the familiar prodigal son story as a whole NEW story — the story of the gracious Father! This new perspective of the familiar story reminds us that our gracious Father loves, forgives, accepts and celebrates our return to Him, always.

Review Decades and Identify Themes

Pastor Wertz asked those gathered to reflect on and discuss St. Stephen in recent decades, noting significant events, staff changes, ministries (preschool, college, etc.), building/property changes and others, for the specific decades. Those gathered around the many tables in the room had a block of several minutes to discuss together and identify significant events during each of the following decades:

1980-1989 1990-1999 2000-2009

2009-2019

After the four "decade" table breakout groups, Pastor Wertz led those present to begin to identify the "themes" from each of the four decades. He noted that where there are common themes across the decades, we are likely to see those themes in our future as a congregation.

Share the Saul – Paul Story

In sharing the story of Saul, who became Paul, Pastor Wertz emphasized how Paul claims his strengths, meets people WHERE they are, becomes a "bridge," and starts at the beginning.

Our stories are not perfect, and it's okay. God chose Paul to prove He can forgive anyone (1 Timothy 1:12-16). God's mercy can save even the most sinful person! We are Easter people, who know the gift of possibilities.

Determining Leadership Needs

Pastor Wertz asserted that St. Stephen is a strong and active congregation. St. Stephen is in the top one-third in terms of size, of the 145 congregations in the Virginia Synod. As he shared this statistic, Pastor Wertz also cautioned St. Stephen about comparing our congregation with others in considering the needs of our congregation regarding leadership. For example, one of our Synod's top 10 largest congregations replaced a departing pastor with a deacon. Another, a congregation smaller than St. Stephen, has two pastors. Leadership needs for St. Stephen are specific to and dependent upon the needs of our congregation.

Table Theme Sharing

As the final exercise of the visioning session, Pastor Wertz invited each table group to share its respective theme(s) we want to see continue at St. Stephen; these were recorded and collected. This exercise helps the congregation begin to think about the call process, about writing a story about who we are and what we need.

ALL Are Needed To Inform the Call Process

ALL are encouraged to share personal perspectives to inform the call process – including not only those who attend worship regularly and those who actively participate in various ministries of the church, but also those who haven't been to St. Stephen in a while, those who were not at the visioning session, those we help through our ministries, and St. Stephen's partners and neighbors.

All Saints Sunday Celebration

On **Sunday, November 3**, we celebrate the festival of All Saints remembering our St. Stephen members and family who have gone to the church Triumphant this past year. While we revere those who have gone before us in faith and remember them in love, we are reminded that God unites all the faithful in to the one holy catholic and apostolic church — the church on earth and the church in heaven through holy baptism. In holy baptism God makes saints out of sinners. In Holy Communion God forgives the sins of all the saints. On this day we give thanks for all the saints "who from their labors rest," who have fought the good fight, who have gained the crown.

On **Sunday, November 3** at both worship services, our choirs will present a large choral work by Aaron David Miller: *Behold Your Saints in Glory: Worshiping with the Saints.* This exceptional work for choir, organ, trumpet and assembly is a complete multi-movement programmatic piece, including readings and prayers from the saints through the ages. Some of those saints include Thomas Aquinas (1225-1274), Francis of Assisi (1182-1226), Patrick of Ireland (c.372-466), and Mother Teresa of Calcutta (1910-1997). Holy Communion will be included in our assembly's liturgy as well as a reading of names deceased this past year in the congregation.
