### SPIRITUALITY, RELIGION, AND POLITICS - PART 2

Last month I offered definitions of three words that get to the core of what we are about, as followers of Jesus and as citizens. I asked what you thought about these, and received a number of very thoughtful responses! To keep us all thinking, I've posted excerpts of those responses below the original definitions. What would you add?

**Spirituality** is the desire for God. (This is true, even when the "spiritual" person does not know his/her desire is for God.) This hunger is created within us by God the Holy Spirit. As God draws us closer in our desire, the Spirit bears fruit within and among us: love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, generosity, faithfulness, gentleness and self-control. Galatians 5:22-23

*"I think this is good, Andy. I believe, though, that spirituality isn't just a desire for God, it's a desire for meaning in being. We might equate that with God, but meaning isn't necessarily equated with God."*

*"John Swinton, in his book Raging With Compassion: Pastoral Responses to the Problem of Evil, suggests that spiritual practices are concrete, specific behaviors that also might fall under religious rites, or even political action. Three that he specifically calls attention to are lament, thoughtfulness, and friendship. So, in short, I no longer think of spiritual or spirituality without thinking what specific practice am I being called to."*

**Religion** is the set of daily and weekly practices that the Spirit uses to cultivate and nourish the fruit of the Spirit within and among us. Engaging in these practices in community decreases the danger of self-absorptive narcissism. Additional indications of spiritual formation are: Hospitality to strangers. Inclusion. Perseverance in prayer. Self-control. Compassion. Humility. Meekness (which means courageous resistance against the impulse to respond to violence with violence). Forgiveness. Thankfulness. Offering blessings rather than curses. Sharing in others' joys and sufferings. Associating with the lowly. Loving and feeding your enemies. Responding to evil with goodness. Romans 12:2, 9-21; Colossians 3:12-17

*"I think it becomes religion when the behaviors are associated specifically with a religious duty or obligation. I admit that part of my bias is that 'religion,' as understood in most homes, is unhelpful. I have a rather dim view of those who seek control over others under the guise of religion. Therefore, I am not a religious person; yet, I am a person who practices his faith. Those of us who choose to practice our faith together are a community, a body of faith. I would not use religion to describe Christianity."*

*"I would offer that religious practices are seasonal, built on the foundation of daily and weekly practices."*

*"I have come to the conclusion that all people are religious (all people have a religion, or have multiple religions, unexamined or not). In my observation, what makes something religious is, as you say, the presence of sort of a system of belief. It does not need to be organized or really that deep, but I believe all humans at some point form some*

*type of structure for aligning those things that they are spiritual about, those things that provide spiritual connection for them or that nurture them spiritually. Religion connects with worship for me (more so than spirituality does), and, as David Foster Wallace said, we don't have a choice whether we worship or not. The only choice we get is what we worship. When I look out at the world, I see that everyone is worshiping something (or several things) whether they realize it consciously or not. And in every case there is some form or aspect of religion around it. One can even form a religion about not wanting to be perceived as religious."*

*"Meekness," one respondent wrote, means "strength under control."*

*"One nuance that I think is missing from your definition of religion is the distinction between religion and dogma. These are too often confused, certainly in popular culture, and all too frequently among Christians themselves. I've bumped up against this many times in conversations with friends and family who describe themselves as 'spiritual, but not religious.' My usual rejoinder is that I am very religious, but not the least bit dogmatic. For me, this means that I recognize that it is God (a whole different definitional dilemma) who calls me into constructive, loving relationships with God and with other people, but I am almost agnostic about the intellectual affirmations of 'truth' about who God is or how God manifests him/her/itself in creation. I think many people conflate religion (daily and weekly practices that the Spirit uses to cultivate and nourish the fruit of the Spirit) with religious dogma (specific intellectual affirmations or beliefs that dictate the form or content of those practices); for the casual reader, I think it would be important to disaggregate those two concepts."*

**Politics** is living together and working together in community and in civic life. Followers of Jesus are called to act politically to make known in the world the characteristics Paul lists in Galatians, Romans and Colossians.

One respondent further defined politics as *"living together and working together in community and in civic life with fellow Christians and those who have*

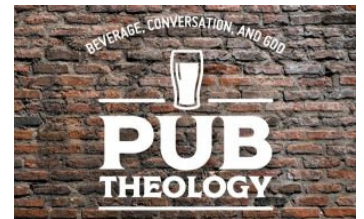
*different beliefs and opinions which should not be ignored."*

*"Your definition of politics is good. In our working it out however, we often interact adversely before seeing that there may be different possibilities of ways to achieve a commonly sought result."*

What would you add to this – as we define our fundamental tasks of bringing God's good news through Jesus the Christ into the world? You have my e-mail address, right? And there's another Pub Theology coming up!

**Why:** The average response time for first responders once 911 is called is 8-12 minutes. For each minute defibrillation is delayed, the chance of survival reduces by approximately 10%. Fortunately, with CPR/AED training, which takes just a few short hours, you can gain the skills necessary to help save a life.

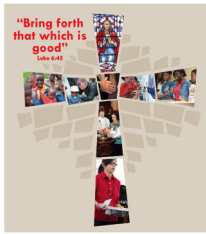
In this CPR/AED course you will learn how – and when – to initiate CPR, and how and when to use an automated external defibrillator (AED). This course combines lecture and hands-on skills so you will be ready to deliver care when it's needed most. This class will teach adult and child CPR and AED use, infant CPR, and how to relieve choking in adults, children, and infants.

**Cost:** \$40. Some scholarships are available if needed, and Child Care will be provided.

### **New Members of the Endowment Fund Committee:**

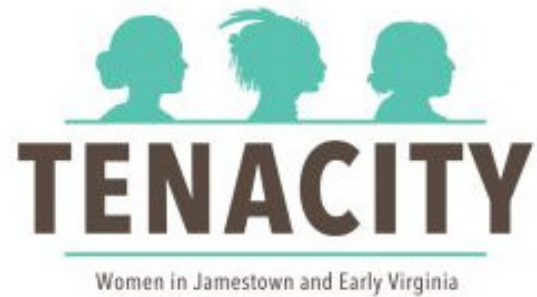

At **7:00 PM**, our own **Nancy Egloff**, the Historian at the Jamestown-Yorktown Foundation, will give a presentation on the major new exhibition she’s been working on that will open **November 10** at Jamestown Settlement.

**“TENACITY: Women in Jamestown and Early Virginia”** will explore little-known, captivating personal stories of real women in Jamestown and the early Virginia colony and their tenacious spirit and impact on a fledgling society. Visitors will hear stories of the first English women in the Virginia colony beginning in 1608 and the Powhatan Indian women they encountered. Exhibits will examine stories of the first documented African women to arrive in Virginia in 1619, and the Virginia Company of London’s effort that same year to recruit English women to expand the Jamestown colony. From women’s roles to women’s rights, the exhibition will connect issues of the 17<sup>th</sup> century and their relevance today.

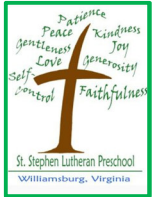
