ENDOWMENT FUND NEWS

Growing enduring gifts for future ministry

The Endowment Fund continues to grow modestly through current giving, bequests and investment income. Total assets at the end of July: \$295,558.

Current support for special projects

The Endowment Fund has paid \$8,250 toward the cost of replacing aging HVAC equipment servicing the Church Office and Fellowship Hall sections of the building. Jane deSolms was elected to a three-year term on the Endowment Fund Committee at the Congregational Meeting in June.

Here's just one of the many ways to make a special gift to the Endowment Fund

Autumn is the perfect time to plan a Qualified Charitable Distribution (QCD) from an IRA before the end of 2019. If you're over age 70½ and take a yearly Required Minimum Distribution (RMD) from your IRA, you have the option to contribute part of all of your distribution directly to a charity. <u>To do</u> <u>that, you must follow one special rule: the financial</u> <u>institution that holds your IRA must make out the</u> <u>check to the charity, not to you.</u> You can count this contribution toward your RMD yet you do not claim it as regular income or pay tax on the amount. However, a QCD can't be claimed as a charitable contribution on your tax return.

If you are new to Qualified Charitable Deduction procedures, it would be a good idea to talk with Financial Secretary **Linda Vonderheide** or **Jane deSolms** before requesting one from your IRA.

Please talk with any member of the Endowment Fund Committee to learn more about making your own enduring gift now or through a bequest.

VISITATION TEAM AT ST. STEPHEN

Our fellow parishioners at St. Stephen may need spiritual, emotional or other support for a number of reasons. Sometimes they may require help that only Pastor Griffin or another ordained pastor could provide. Perhaps their needs are more health-related and a visit from the Parish Nurse or other member of the Health Ministry Team may be needed. Individuals undergoing stressful situations, especially over extended periods, may benefit from weekly visits from one of our Stephen Ministers.

Some of our members find themselves unable to attend worship due to medical infirmity or physical disability. It is easy to see how these members may feel left out or otherwise not included in the body of the church. We provide fellowship by visitation on a regular basis and by the extension of communion from our worship services by home communion ministers.

Others who are unable to attend church regularly are the caregivers. They are the ones who look after loved ones who are unable to care for themselves. They may also need to receive the fellowship of a caring visit from one of our visitation team members.

The Visitation Team at St. Stephen needs a few good men and women to help boost our numbers. The more visitation team members we have, the better the service that we can provide. We can use members for the visitation team, for the home communion team, for the health ministry team, or to consider entering training to become Stephen Ministers. DISASTER PREPAREDNESS

September is National Preparedness Month. This is the peak of Atlantic hurricane season but many other things qualify as disasters. Attacks in public places, severe weather, fires, floods, and prolonged power outages are just a few of the events that are listed as disasters. While hurricanes happen during a specific time frame, other disasters can occur anytime during the year. Survival depends on knowing you have a plan and being able to carry it out effectively.

This year's theme is: "Prepared, Not Scared. Be Ready for Disasters." It is a time for individuals to get an emergency supply kit, make a family emergency plan, be informed about the different emergencies that may affect them, as well as taking the necessary steps to get trained and become engaged in community preparedness and response efforts.

The importance of being prepared cannot be overstated. Trying to figure out what to do in the midst of an emergency will produce less than optimal results. If you have pets, remember to include them in the preparations. If someone in your home is handicapped, disabled or otherwise unable to care for themselves, you need to have plans in place that will allow for their safety as well. COMMUNITY FOUNDATION

SAFE & HEALTHY CHURCHES TRAINING

The inFaith Community Foundation is offering a training session geared toward ending family violence. It is being offered to clergy and lay leaders in order to help them understand the dynamics of domestic and sexual violence. The session highlights protocols to protect victims, prevent future harm, and respond effectively and sensitively to victims and survivors. Teams of 3-4 from each church are encouraged to attend. saint of animals and the environment. Bring your family pet for a blessing! If you wish to bring dog or cat food or pet toys, these will be taken to the Heritage Humane Society following the blessing.





Our denomination, the ELCA, holds a churchwide assembly triennially to worship, vote on matters of governance and policy, and be church together for the sake of the world. This past week's churchwide assembly was full of important votes and actions, including:

- Presiding Bishop Elizabeth Eaton was reelected for a second six-year term on the first ballot.
- A declaration of apology to our siblings of African descent, which was
 received by the African Descent Lutheran Association with thanks and a
 call for accountability and living into the words shared.
- Approved resolution declaring the ELCA is a "sanctuary church body," encouraging participation in the ELCA AMMPARO initiative for migrant children, discernment of care for our immigrant neighbors in our context, and the promise of forthcoming resources for this work.
- Approved support for the World Council of Church's *Thursdays in* Black, awareness movement for a world without rape and violence.
- Voted to commemorate June 17 as a day of repentance, in honor and remembrance of the martyrdom of the Emanuel 9.
- Approved a declaration for inter-religious commitment, reaffirming ecumenical and interfaith partnerships.
- Approved the recommendations from a strategic taskforce which has been studying how to work toward authentic diversity in our church.
- Approved memorials: affirming but not "endorsing" the Poor People's Campaign, care for immigrants and refugees, and other statements.
- Adopted a new social statement, "Faith, Sexism, and Justice: a Lutheran Call to Action," and its implementing resolutions.
- Deacon Sue Rothmeyer was elected Churchwide Secretary, a full-time position which acts as executive administrator and leader on all constitutional matters and interpretation.
- Constitutional change for Deacons (rostered ministers of word and service) to be ordained, from the previous practice of consecration.
- Celebrated the milestones of 50 years of women's ordination, 40 years since the first woman of color was ordained, and 10 years since full inclusion of LGBTQIA+ clergy.
