Provisions for the Journey

Why are you a Christian? Why are you a Lutheran Christian? How does God come to you in worship? How does God come to you in the Bible? Why is weekly worship and daily Bible reading essential for the journey?

Those are pretty basic questions. Perhaps you can give thoughtful answers, from your experience combined with your depth in the Lutheran faith tradition!

Since you gave me a sabbatical three years ago, I have been thinking about the transformation that needs to take place at St. Stephen, for the congregation to be thriving when I retire. The transformation has begun, indeed! I'd like to include more of you in what the Spirit is doing among us!

Here's one thing that will be necessary for St. Stephen to thrive into the next generation. More of us need to take advantage of our congregation as a center for learning. As more of us become more deeply grounded in the Tradition of the Christian faith (capital "T"), as well as in the Lutheran Christian tradition (small "t"), we will be more excited about our journey, and others will see that in us.

It seems to me that there are four important areas of knowledge, or foundations for faith, or, to use more interesting metaphors, four essential provisions that a follower of Jesus needs for the journey.

I. For the journey, you need the water of worship.

How do you experience God in worship? How does God come to you in word, sacrament and the community of other worshippers? Why do we do what we do in worship? What difference does it make for your daily journey, when you actually pay close attention to the earth-shaking words that we sing, say and hear in the liturgy?

II. For the journey, you need the food of the Bible.

How can you get over your feeling of intimidation, to be able to open the Bible and have the confidence to explore what's actually in there? What happens to you when you spend 15 minutes a day reading and praying over a short passage in the Bible. Think of what might happen to you, as the Spirit forms your faith through this regular practice!

III. For the journey, you need the shoes, socks and clothing of salvation.

This means rooting yourself more deeply in the Lutheran tradition of the Christian faith, understanding God as grace, compassion and forgiveness, and acting as disciples out of that grace-filled joy!

IV. For the journey, you need the backpack full of daily faith practices.

"Lord, teach us to pray," asked Jesus' disciples one time. There are many ways to pray, according to the challenges and opportunities that we are facing. In addition to the practices of worship and prayerful reading of the Bible and other writing, how can the Spirit lead you into practices such as regular conversation with a spiritual companion, offering hospitality to the stranger, practicing self-examination and discernment? How does sabbath-keeping improve your physical and emotional health? Do you take care of your body in a way that gives praise to your Creator? How are you at the practice of forgiveness? The practice of generosity?

Some of you have done significant work in these areas since growing to adulthood. Many others find it a challenge to envision a faith perspective wider than what they learned as children in "Sunday School." As one "on fire" disciple put it to me a couple of weeks ago, "Spending time reading Marcus Borg and John Dominick Crossan just opens up a whole new world of perspective! Borg and Crossan are only two writers whose work will lead you into the joyous depths of the Tradition.

For the years that God gives me to be pastor of St. Stephen Lutheran Church, I will be urging each one of you to give attention to each of those four provisions for the journey – with the same seriousness as you would give to learning new competencies for your profession!

These four “provisions” will be our program of study this year, for adult faith formation on Sunday mornings, 10:00 – 10:45 AM, in the College Room.

1. How do you experience God in worship? We'll use the explanatory material that's throughout *Evangelical Lutheran Worship*.
2. How do you experience God in the Bible? We'll use the explanatory material that's throughout a study Bible, such as the *Lutheran Study Bible*. We'll use *Opening the Book of Faith*. (Do you have a copy of that book, or a study Bible? Ordering opportunities will be made available!)
3. How do you experience salvation? We'll use; *Martin Luther's Catechisms: Forming the Faith*, by Tim Wengert.
How do you experience God through daily faith practices? We'll use *Soul Feast*, by Marjorie Thompson.

We'll offer provisions for the journey during the week, as well. To address “provision #4,” we'll use *Soul Feast* on Monday evenings and Wednesday afternoons during the fall, and Stephen Ministers will use *Finding My Way Home*, by Henri Nouwen for their fall continuing education.

Join with others in our congregation receiving provisions for our journey in faith!

One of the themes that I see in our society is the constant need to prepare for something. It is currently hurricane season, so we need to make sure that we are prepared in case one strikes. We are preparing for a very divisive presidential campaign next year. School is starting, so teachers and students are preparing for school with shopping and reading (I loved one student's summer reading book -- *The Hobbit* by JRR Tolkien). Every week Stacey and I prepare a list of meals and what we need to make it for grocery shopping. Constant preparation...

When do we ever just Be? When does all that preparation just stop and we exist in the here and now? Realizing that this is counter-cultural, the American need to “Be Prepared” ingrained in everything from Boy Scouting to public service announcements, sometimes it is good to just Be instead of preparing for everything. A constant state of anxiety can be brought about by our ever present need for preparation. The fear that something will go wrong or be forgotten is ever present. This was something drummed into me by the Army, which was an understandable goal when lives are on the line in a combat zone. However, after a point it goes from being a reasonable goal of good enough, to the idea of perfection that can never be achieved, which was pursued with the zealotry of, well, a religion!

One of the many messages that I have picked up just working around the office, and attending Synod events, for the last year is the importance of taking time to breathe and occasionally just Be. While this is much more easily said than done, it has had something of an effect. Trying to put aside the constant pressure to prepare something, do something, be doing something, and taking time to simply Be. I have found it easier to hear God this way, when taking time to simply exist and exist in the moment. This is not always easy, particularly when your toddler is banging a book in your lap to read, or having a crying fit when you won't give them juice instead of water, or, well, the list is endless. However, when she is asleep, simply Being is possible, if only for a moment before drifting off to sleep. This is when I find it

easiest to be with God, and not preparing for the rest of my life.

While I am not advocating for an overthrow of the American way of life (well, maybe a little), perhaps we need to balance it with time when we don't preoccupy ourselves with constant preparation and instead spend a little time with God, simply Being and allowing ourselves to hear what God is intending. It is hard, particularly if you have children, but taking time to prepare in a totally different way is important too!

Quill Article from the Director of Music





August 2011 Update for our Renovation Project

There has been significant progress in the renovation in the month since the July article. The extensions to the Narthex have been framed and the steel "I" beams which provide the bones of the extension have been installed. The old roof has been removed to make way for the new installation. The trim molding around the top of the Narthex extensions is being installed and the windows have been installed.

The temporary walls have been removed to clear the way for the interior work. As a result of all this ongoing work, dust and dirt found its way into the Sanctuary. Because of this the organ was wrapped prior to the schedule closure to protect it and will remain wrapped until the renovation project is completed.

The plans are being made to start using the fellowship hall for services. This change is required to give the contractor free and unobstructed access to the Sanctuary.

The steeple has been stripped and had new flashing installed to make it watertight. Some maintenance issues have been identified and will be repaired as a part of the reinstallation process.

We planned for recessed lighting in the ceiling of the ramps leading from the Narthex. However, ductwork for the air conditioning is in the way and does not allow sufficient room for installation of the recessed lights. Temporarily, the sconces will remain with an eye toward replacing them later. The remainder of the Narthex lighting is scheduled for delivery and installation within the next few weeks.

Our Contractor, David Nice Company has assigned Lee Macintosh as the new site superintendent for our project. Lee is very knowledgeable and capable and I look forward to completing this project with him.

The tentative completion date for the renovation is October 7.

Upcoming Milestones:

- Bricks are being delivered on August 17 and should start to be installed shortly.

- Interior work in the Narthex is coming together with the wiring installation being completed and the interior walls should be going up as soon as the preparations are complete.

It's a new Faith Formation Year! services and are divided into appropriate age groups for lessons. Volunteers help to teach the bible story or other Christian education topic through reading the bible, craft or other activities, demonstrations, and singing. The middle school and high school youth also meet between the services. Please let Jim know if you have time and talent to share.



Feeding the homeless gets great support at St. Stephen

Here is yet another way that St. Stephen shines in our community! Once each month St. Stephen members cook, box, and deliver full hot meals for an increasing number of Williamsburg homeless families living at a local motel.

More than 45 St. Stephen people volunteered when the program was first announced – so many that we have two teams working under the leadership of **Randy Punched** and **Michael Javier**. Michael and Randy plan the menus for their teams, give needed recipes, assess the number of dinners needed and communicate to their teams. For example, in July, under Michael's leadership, we served a full meal to 48 people - 41 adults, one teenager, four children ranging in age from 3 to 7, and two infants. In addition, bags full of baby food, supplies, and toys were provided for the infants.

The Friday night meal service for the homeless has been going on about a year and each month we see more families needing and receiving help. St. Stephen is part of a group of more than 12 churches in Williamsburg. About 45 people from St. Stephen volunteered when Randy asked for help. What follows is part of a message to Michael from Kay Cheves who is the point of contact for the “From His Hands” ministry which also provides dinner at Grove on Thursday evenings:

Your church members have been very generous in meeting the needs of others in the community, including serving at the homeless shelter, the Grove Christian Outreach Center, and the PORT program for the homeless in Newport News. I know you have been working with the PORT program for several years, and we are very glad you are a partner church with the From His Hand ministry.

A big thank you to both the teams! Word might even get around that we have a lot of fun as well.

After several years of dedicated service, **Nancy and John Rivolta** have decided to step down as our Fair Trade Coordinators. The Social Ministry Committee thanks them for wonderful service in organizing and managing this ministry.

We are seeking folks to serve in this important ministry. Here is a brief summary of the duties:

- ordering products (once/month);
- collecting the funds from purchases (weekly);
- recording sales & making deposits (twice/month);
- keeping inventory on the carts and in the kitchen pantry;
- unpacking products;
- keeping in touch about products and/or price changes

It helps to have two people handle this ministry – one


to do the physical work and one to do the paperwork and handle the funds. The average time per month is about four to five hours – a manageable and fun job! And the Fair Trade products support small independent farmers in many areas of the world – a win-win situation for all of us!

The 2012 Godparents for Tanzania Safari

Have you ever wondered what Tanzania really looks like?

This East Africa nation stretches from the Indian Ocean in the east to the mountains and valleys in the west.



Did you know that Tanzania includes some of the most famous sites in Africa?

Mt. Kilimanjaro, for instance, is probably the most famous – but other spectacular places include Amboseli National Park, Serengeti National Park, as well as Ngorongoro Conservation Area.

Do you know that you can become a “Godparent” for a Tanzanian child?

The Godparents for Tanzania Program (G4TZ) literally changes the lives of young people in Tanzania! Since there is no free public education in Tanzania, many families can’t afford to send their kids to school. Many children who complete primary school are not able to go on to secondary school – and even fewer can afford to attend university, without assistance. But, with the help of Godparents for Tanzania, children and young adults are now able to get an education.

Godparents pay school fees for a student for a year – at primary or secondary school, or at university (for study in education, health and wildlife management). The current annual scholarship amount is \$540, which may be paid in increments within a 12-month period. This gift covers school fees, uniform, supplies, exercise books, transportation and health care when needed. Godparents receive personal and biographical information about their students, including a photo and contact information, when possible. The student is informed that you are supporting him or her, and you may share your contact information. Godparents receive an annual report from G4TZ on their student’s progress. Several members of St. Stephen are Godparents for Tanzanian children!

Would you like to visit the village of Mongai?

Would you like to meet some of the people who are our partners in the Mongai educational projects? We have helped our partners at Mongai to build a grain (maize) mill, a sunflower seed press and a welding machine – all of which have improved their village work and have earned money to support the scholarships for their children. The latest major project at Mongai is a Vocational Training School, which provides training for the 60% of Mongai teenagers who are not able to attend secondary school. The MVTS includes a new carpentry shop, which was dedicated last year. The plan includes a tailoring department, a welding course and a computer lab. Our partners at Mongai are determined to educate their children and to provide more opportunities for a better, healthier future for them.

What an exciting opportunity – to travel on an African Safari – and visit Mongai, too!

The 2012 Discovery Safari is a two-week visit to northern Tanzania (July 11-26) – led by Pastor Dwayne Westermann, Director of G4TZ. Travelers will visit several villages, including Mongai. This will be a completely authentic experience, visiting village homes, schools, churches and health centers – as well as the big game drives at the famous national parks.




Shoes for Grove Update


St. Stephen Quilters return to their monthly meetings

Preschool News






