As We Gather

In today's gospel the Samaritan woman asks Jesus for water, an image of our thirst for God. Jesus offers living water, a sign of God's grace flowing from the waters of baptism. We are baptized into Christ's death and resurrection, God's act to accomplish our salvation "while we were still weak," as Paul puts it in today's second reading; "while we still were sinners;" even "while we were enemies" of God! During the season of Lent we are returning to our baptisms.

Exodus 17:1-7 – Moses and the people are wandering in the desert wilderness. Because the thirsty people quarrel with Moses and put the Lord to the test, Moses cries out in desperation to the Lord. The Lord commands Moses to strike the rock to provide water for the people. The doubt-filled question – "Is the Lord among us or not?" – receives a very positive answer!

Psalm 95 – "Let us shout for joy to the rock of our salvation." (verse 1)

Romans 5:1-11 –God has intervened to save us through the death and resurrection of our Lord Jesus Christ. The result is suffering that leads to hope. God's love has been poured into our hearts through the Holy Spirit that has been given to us. We have now received reconciliation with God.

John 4:5-42 – This morning, we enjoy the first of three long, great stories that we'll read on Sunday mornings in the gospel of John. Jesus shocks even his disciples by engaging in theological conversation with a *Samaritan* (a heretic who would have been excluded by the religious rulers of God's people), and a *woman* (one who was not considered to be competent in such matters)! Notice the twists and turns in this conversation, which is often comic!

Why do you test the LORD?" ³But the people thirsted there for water; and the people complained against Moses and said, "Why did you bring us out of Egypt, to kill us and our children and livestock with thirst?" ⁴So Moses cried out to the LORD, "What shall I do with this people? They are almost ready to stone me." ⁵The LORD said to Moses, "Go on ahead of the people, and take some of the elders of Israel with you; take in your hand the staff with which you struck the Nile, and go. ⁶I will be standing there in front of you on the rock at Horeb. Strike the rock, and water will come out of it, so that the people may drink." Moses did so, in the sight of the elders of Israel. ⁷He called the place Massah and Meribah, because the Israelites quarreled and tested the LORD, saying, "Is the LORD among us or not?"

⁶For while we were still weak, at the right time Christ died for the ungodly. ⁷Indeed, rarely will anyone die for a righteous person--though perhaps for a good person someone might actually dare to die. ⁸But God proves his love for us in that while we still were sinners Christ died for us. ⁹Much more surely then, now that we have been justified by his blood, will we be saved through him from the wrath of God. ¹⁰For if while we were enemies, we were reconciled to God through the death of his Son, much more surely, having been reconciled, will we be saved by his life. ¹¹But more than that, we even boast in God through our Lord Jesus Christ, through whom we have now received reconciliation.
