The 50 day season of Easter lasts until Pentecost (from the Greek for "50"). Luther taught that the stories of the Bible *do something* to us: they convict us in our sin and offer the good news of forgiveness, salvation and eternal life through the death and resurrection of Christ. How will this morning's stories work that purpose in you?

Acts 5:27-32 – Did you know that, during the season of Easter, we do not read from the Hebrew Scriptures? Instead, the first reading will be from the Acts of the Apostles, a story of the first-generation attempts to spread the good news that Christ is risen! In this morning's story, some of Jesus followers had been arrested for proclaiming that good news. Peter's response to the charges of the high priest summarizes the early church's proclamation of forgiveness of sin through repentance.

Revelation 1:4-8 – The vision that makes up the book of Revelation comes from a late-1st century community of Jesus followers suffering persecution by the Roman emperor. There is great value for us in reading Revelation, when we remember suffering Christians around the world (Iraq, Syria, Pakistan, for instance) for whom it would be great good news to see the Son of Man "coming with the clouds" to end their anguish, and to establish the kingdom of justice, righteousness and peace.

John 20:19-31 – This story takes place on the evening of Jesus' resurrection, and then, the next Sunday evening. The risen Jesus brings to his followers peace through the Holy Spirit. Thomas is not present on the first evening, and his struggles to believe relate to our own, we who did not see Jesus in his physical resurrected body. What Jesus says to Thomas the gospel writer addresses to us all: "Blessed are those who have not seen and yet have come to believe."


