


#### **Second Reading**


<sup>1</sup>What then are we to say was gained by Abraham, our ancestor according to the flesh? <sup>2</sup>For if Abraham was justified by works, he has something to boast about, but not before God. <sup>3</sup>For what does the scripture say? "Abraham believed God, and it was reckoned to him as righteousness." <sup>4</sup>Now to one who works, wages are not reckoned as a gift but as something due. <sup>5</sup>But to one who without works trusts him who justifies the ungodly, such faith is reckoned as righteousness.

<sup>13</sup>For the promise that he would inherit the world did not come to Abraham or to his descendants through the law but through the righteousness of faith. <sup>14</sup>If it is the adherents of the law who are to be the heirs, faith is null and the promise is void. <sup>15</sup>For the law brings wrath; but where there is no law, neither is there violation.

<sup>16</sup>For this reason it depends on faith, in order that the promise may rest on grace and be guaranteed to all his descendants, not only to the adherents of the law but also to those who share the faith of Abraham (for he is the father of all of us, <sup>17</sup>as it is written, "I have made you the father of many nations")—in the presence of the God in whom he believed, who gives life to the dead and calls into existence the things that do not exist.

of God without being born of water and Spirit. <sup>6</sup>What is born of the flesh is flesh, and what is born of the Spirit is spirit. <sup>7</sup>Do not be astonished that I said to you, 'You must be born from above.' <sup>8</sup>The wind blows where it chooses, and you hear the sound of it, but you do not know where it comes from or where it goes. So it is with everyone who is born of the Spirit." <sup>9</sup>Nicodemus said to him, "How can these things be?" <sup>10</sup>Jesus answered him, "Are you a teacher of Israel, and yet you do not understand these things?

<sup>11</sup>"Very truly, I tell you, we speak of what we know and testify to what we have seen; yet you do not receive our testimony. <sup>12</sup>If I have told you about earthly things and you do not believe, how can you believe if I tell you about heavenly things? <sup>13</sup>No one has ascended into heaven except the one who descended from heaven, the Son of Man. <sup>14</sup>And just as Moses lifted up the serpent in the wilderness, so must the Son of Man be lifted up, <sup>15</sup>that whoever believes in him may have eternal life.

<sup>16</sup>"For God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him may not perish but may have eternal life.

<sup>17</sup>"Indeed, God did not send the Son into the world to condemn the world, but in order that the world might be saved through him."



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

#### Service: RIP Medical Debt.

The United States is the only developed country in the world today without a program of health care centralized by the government as a basic service to its citizens. Instead, we have maintained a sometimes chaotic marketplace of health insurance products available to our population, and this patchwork system inevitably results in overwhelming debt for many people with inadequate coverage. More than 100 million U.S. adults struggle with healthcare debt, and there is more than \$195 billion owed nationwide. Our congregation's Social Ministry Coordinating Committee would like to address this issue during Lent. We have chosen to work with and through RIP Medical Debt, an organization founded eight years ago to work to end medical debt in our country. Working with medical providers who have long-standing debt owed them by patients unable to pay it, RIPMD is able to purchase this debt at pennies on the dollar and then retire it for good. We have set a goal of collecting \$1,800 during Lent toward this end, and we ask for your help in meeting this goal. Please consider making a weekly \$5 or \$10 donation (or a onetime donation) during Lent to help us meet this goal. Be sure to note that it is for our Medical Debt initiative.

#### Health Ministry

#### **Daylight Savings Time**

I always try to write a little reminder of Daylight Savings Time. It will occur on March 12 this year. Moving into DST has effects on our health. It can affect your circadian rhythm because you are exposed to less morning light and more evening light. This in turn can cause you to feel more tired in the morning and cause you to have more difficulty falling asleep at night. While these seem like small things, they really can cascade into more serious problems. Lack of sleep can cause increased depression, slowed metabolism, and an increase in cluster headaches.

There are things you can do to improve your odds of protecting your circadian rhythms.

- Keep your sleep habits the same. Avoid the trap of sleeping in and staying up later when DST begins.
- Spend time outside in the natural light, especially in the mornings.
- Avoid things that cause sleep disruption such as caffeine, alcohol, and blue light exposure for two hours before your bedtime.
- Exercise in the morning. The increased activity will help to raise your body temperature and thereby help you to wake up.

So this is your one week early reminder to set your clocks ahead this coming Saturday night. I hope to see you on Sunday.

#### Perpetua and Felicity and companions, martyrs at Carthage, died 202 Tuesday, March 7, 2023

Vibia Perpetua, a noblewoman, and Felicity, an enslaved woman, were catechumens at Carthage, northern Africa. They, with four other catechumens, had defied the Roman emperor who had forbidden conversions to Christianity, and were put to death in the amphitheater.

# Harriet Tubman, died 1913; Sojourner Truth, died 1883; renewers of society Friday, March 10, 2023

Harriet Tubman, born into slavery, helped about 300 others to escape slavery until the institution was abolished. Sojourner Truth, whose birth name was Isabella, was freed after slavery was abolished, and discerned a call to be a preacher. Taking the name Sojourner Truth, she set out on an evangelistic journey, where people found her testimony to be deeply moving. 
