The Vigil of Easter

April 8, 2023

About the Easter Vigil

In its present structure the Vigil dates to the early 2nd century. The Vigil is filled with primordial symbols - light and darkness, fire and water, bread and wine - and with dramatic transitions - from darkness to light, from death to new life, from bondage to liberation, from fasting to great Eucharistic feasting. ("Eucharist" from the Greek for *thanksgiving*.)

Throughout the Vigil, we celebrate Christ's passage from death to resurrection as a new moment in salvation history, a moment in which Christians are active participants through Word and Baptism and Holy Communion (what Lutherans call "word and sacrament").

The Vigil consists of four parts: Light, Readings, Baptism and Holy Communion.

- 1. The *Service of Light* focuses on the paschal candle (from *pascha*, Passover), an ancient symbol of the Risen Christ. Fire has long been perceived as a sign of God's presence. The Service of Light derived from the ancient Jewish custom of lamp-lighting at the beginning of the Sabbath. The early Christians continued ritual lamp-lighting, understanding it as a symbol of the resurrected Christ.
- 2. The Service of Light culminates with the singing of the Easter Proclamation. "This is the night," the prayer calls out over and over. For Christians, Easter is the night of the Passover lamb, the escape through the sea, the end of darkness, the rescue from evil, Christ's triumph over hell, even the marriage of heaven and earth." The text derives from at least the 4th century; its present form can be traced to the 7th century.
- 3. How can we understand that gospel message of Christ's resurrection? In the *Service of Readings*, "we look to other parts of the Scriptures to see how God brings life out of death." We read stories of God's mighty acts in history, understanding them by the light of Christ.
- 4. The *Service of Holy Baptism* follows. Twenty-first century liturgical churches are in the process of recovering the ancient practice (since at least the beginning of the 3rd century) of the Vigil as the primary time to celebrate baptism. That is because baptism is the sacrament of being joined to Christ's death and resurrection, as we hear in tonight's reading from Romans. Baptism is the Christian's passage from darkness to light, from guilt to grace, from burial with Christ to new life in his resurrection. We enact all of this tonight!

5. The Vigil comes to its climax, in the power of Christ's death and resurrection, as we share in *the first Eucharist of Easter*. In this sacrament, we eat and drink the real presence of the Risen Christ in the bread and wine, the body and blood.

Service of Light

The grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, the love of God, and the communion of the Holy Spirit be with you all. **And also with you.**

Sisters and brothers in Christ, on this most holy night when our Savior Jesus Christ passed from death to life, we gather with the church throughout the world in vigil and prayer. This is the Passover of Jesus Christ. Through light and the word, through water, bread and wine, we proclaim Christ's death and resurrection, share Christ's triumph over sin and death, and await Christ's coming again in glory. May the light of Christ, rising in glory, dispel the darkness of our hearts and minds.

Candles are lit. We process bringing Christ's light into the Church.

The Great Thanksgiving

It is indeed right and salutary that we should with full devotion of heart and mind and voice praise the invisible God, the Father Almighty, and his only Son, our Lord, Jesus Christ;

Who paid for us the debt of Adam to the eternal Father, and who, by his precious blood, redeemed us from the bondage to the ancient sin.

For this indeed is the Paschal Feast in which the true Lamb is slain, by whose blood the doorposts of the faithful are made holy.

This is the night in which, in ancient times, you delivered our forbearers, the children of Israel, from the land of Egypt; and led them, dry-shod, through the Red Sea.

This is the night in which all who believe in Christ are rescued from evil and the gloom of sin, are renewed in grace and holiness, by the rising brightness.

This is the night in which, breaking the chains of death, Christ arises from hell in triumph.

O night truly blessed which alone was worthy to know the time and the hour wherein Christ arose again from hell!

O night truly blessed in which heaven and earth are joined – things human and things divine.

We therefore pray to you, O Lord, that He, in whose honor this candle burns, will continue to vanquish the darkness of this night and faithfully shed light on all the human race;

Through the same Lord, Jesus Christ, your Son, who lives and rules with you in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever. **Amen.**

Prayer of the Day

Eternal giver of life and light, this holy night shines with the radiance of the risen Christ. Renew your church with the Spirit given us in baptism, that we may worship you in sincerity and truth and may shine as a light in the world, through your Son, Jesus Christ our Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever. **Amen.**

I do, and I ask God to help and guide me.

People of God, do you promise to support and pray for one another in your life in Christ?

We do, and we ask God to help and guide us.

Let us pray.

We give you thanks, O God, that through water and the Holy Spirit you give us new birth, cleanse us from sin, and raise us to eternal life. Stir up in your people the gift of your Holy Spirit: the spirit of wisdom and understanding, the spirit of counsel and might, the spirit of knowledge and the fear of the Lord, the spirit of joy in your presence both now and forever. **Amen.**
