II. Word: God speaks to us in scripture reading, preaching, and song

First Reading Isaiah 5:1-7

The prophet sings a sad, parable-like love song about the relationship between God and Israel. In this song Israel is compared to a promising vineyard. Despite God's loving care, the vineyard that is Israel has brought forth "wild grapes" of injustice and distress, when fine grapes of justice and righteousness were expected.

Let me sing for my beloved my love-song concerning his vineyard: My beloved had a vineyard on a very fertile hill.
He dug it and cleared it of stones, and planted it with choice vines; he built a watchtower in the midst of it, and hewed out a wine vat in it; he expected it to yield grapes, but it yielded wild grapes.

³And now, inhabitants of Jerusalem and people of Judah, judge between me and my vineyard.
 ⁴What more was there to do for my vineyard that I have not done in it?
 When I expected it to yield grapes, why did it yield wild grapes?

⁵And now I will tell you what I will do to my vineyard. I will remove its hedge, and it shall be devoured; I will break down its wall.

and it shall be trampled down.

⁶I will make it a waste;
it shall not be pruned or hoed,
and it shall be overgrown with briers and thorns;
I will also command the clouds
that they rain no rain upon it.

⁷For the vineyard of the LORD of hosts is the house of Israel, and the people of Judah are his pleasant planting; he expected justice, but saw bloodshed; righteousness, but heard a cry!

¹⁵behold and | tend this vine; preserve what your right | hand has planted. *Refrain* Paul reviews some of his supposed credentials, which no longer have any bearing in comparison to the right relationship he has been given through the death of Christ. The power of Christ's resurrection motivates him to press on toward the ultimate goal, eternal life with Christ.

[Paul writes:] ^{4b}If anyone else has reason to be confident in the flesh, I have more: ⁵circumcised on the eighth day, a member of the people of Israel, of the tribe of Benjamin, a Hebrew born of Hebrews; as to the law, a Pharisee; ⁶as to zeal, a persecutor of the church; as to righteousness under the law, blameless.

⁷Yet whatever gains I had, these I have come to regard as loss because of Christ. ⁸More than that, I regard everything as loss because of the surpassing value of knowing Christ Jesus my Lord. For his sake I have suffered the loss of all things, and I regard them as rubbish, in order that I may gain Christ ⁹and be found in him, not having a righteousness of my own that comes from the law, but one that comes through faith in Christ, the righteousness from God based on faith. ¹⁰I want to know Christ and the power of his resurrection and the sharing of his sufferings by becoming like him in his death, ¹¹if somehow I may attain the resurrection from the dead.

¹²Not that I have already obtained this or have already reached the goal; but I press on to make it my own, because Christ Jesus has made me his own. ¹³Beloved, I do not consider that I have made it my own; but this one thing I do: forgetting what lies behind and straining forward to what lies ahead, ¹⁴I press on toward the goal for the prize of the heavenly call of God in Christ Jesus.

Gospel Acclamation



Jesus says, I chose you and ap-|pointed you* to go and bear fruit | that will last. (John 15:16)

Jesus tells a parable to the religious leaders who are plotting his death, revealing that their plans will, ironically, bring about the fulfillment of scripture.

Response after announcement of the Gospel: "Glory to you, O Lord."

[Jesus said to the people:] ³³"Listen to another parable. There was a landowner who planted a vineyard, put a fence around it, dug a wine press in it, and built a watchtower. Then he leased it to tenants and went to another country. ³⁴When the harvest time had come, he sent his slaves to the tenants to collect his produce. ³⁵But the tenants seized his slaves and beat one, killed another, and stoned another. ³⁶Again he sent other slaves, more than the first; and they treated them in the same way. ³⁷Finally he sent his son to them, saying, 'They will respect my son.' ³⁸But when the tenants saw the son, they said to themselves, 'This is the heir; come, let us kill him and get his inheritance.' ³⁹So they seized him, threw him out of the vineyard, and killed him. ⁴⁰Now when the owner of the vineyard comes, what will he do to those tenants?" ⁴¹They said to him, "He will put those wretches to a miserable death, and lease the vineyard to other tenants who will give him the produce at the harvest time."

⁴²Jesus said to them, "Have you never read in the scriptures:

'The stone that the builders rejected

has become the cornerstone;

this was the Lord's doing,

and it is amazing in our eyes'?

⁴³Therefore I tell you, the kingdom of God will be taken away from you and given to a people that produces the fruits of the kingdom. ⁴⁴The one who falls on this stone will be broken to pieces; and it will crush anyone on whom it falls."

⁴⁵When the chief priests and the Pharisees heard his parables, they realized that he was speaking about them. ⁴⁶They wanted to arrest him, but they feared the crowds, because they regarded him as a prophet.





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

COMMUNITY OF FAITH MISSION HOMELESS EMERGENCY SHELTER

It is season 12 of this ministry and St. Stephen has been able to serve from the very beginning due to everyone's generous support.

This year Host Partners have covered food and volunteers for all but three weeks. With the help of local hotels, COFM is providing shelter for those three weeks. They need meals and volunteer support staff for those three weeks. One of those is the week after Christmas. Temple Beth El is covering Christmas Eve and Christmas Day.

Because of your generous donations to our Homeless Ministry Fund, the Social Ministry Coordinating Committee has agreed to provide Dinner and bag lunches to the Homeless Guests at the Shelter on **December 26**th and 27th. The hotel will provide breakfast.

For each of those evenings, nights, and early mornings, we need a grand total of eight volunteers in multiple shifts an outlined schedule is available in the gathering space to sign up or you can contact Hollie Jones at the church office if you are able to volunteer for any date(s) and shift(s), Office@saintstephenluthean.net.

We need to have a good estimate of those able to volunteer no later than Sunday, October 29, 2023, since the COFM In-Person Volunteer Training is Wednesday, November 1, 2023 as noted from COFM as follows:

"... Volunteer Training: **Wednesday, November 1, 6:30 p.m. - 8:00**, Williamsburg Community Chapel, Teen Room/Traditional shelter area (NORTH entrance). Anyone who volunteers at the shelter is required to attend training"

Please note that if you cannot attend training or if you sign up late, you can watch recorded training on the COFM website (not YouTube). Also, if you decide to volunteer very late you can volunteer on "Sign-Up Genius" on that COFM website (www.cofm.info).

In 2022 there were 419 homeless persons on any given night per Newport News, /Virginia Peninsula Chamber of Commerce. To quote COFM, "...our commitment to serving the homeless community remains unwavering..." Sign up if you can and please say a prayer for this special, giving homeless ministry.
