### WORSHIP

In preparation for the Adult Education opportunity, I will be leading in May on Liturgy, I thought we might explore some of that topic in my article this month.

What is Worship? We go to worship every Sunday. We read about worship in the Bible. But how would you define worship to someone? It's tricky in part because the English word "worship" is used to translate many different Hebrew and Greek words in the Bible! These words mean things like bowing down, showing your complete dependence on someone, serving, and expressing your devotion (love) to God. All of this can be boiled down to a simple definition: Worship is one of the main ways we show God love and seek to experience God's love in return.

The liturgy (literally meaning "the work of the people") is basically the order of service, the way we run our church services. Specifically, when we use the term "liturgy" we are referring to the text and songs that we say and sing out of our hymnal/bulletin. Most of the liturgy is based on Scripture, and much of it has been used by Christian churches for over a thousand years! Why do we use this liturgy? Our liturgy has been written and shaped by many people to teach us how to give thanks, praise, pray, confess, and give—really, how to worship God!

#### Some Definitions...

*Worship:* How we show our love to God, primarily through thanksgiving, praise, prayer, giving, and learning.

*Thanksgiving:* God has done wonderful things for us, from the beauty of creation to giving us our daily bread. Most of all, God sent the Son to die for us so that we could be adopted into God's family: "We love because he first loved us" (1 John 4:19).

*Praise:* The difference between praise and thanksgiving is a bit fuzzy. We say thanks when someone has done something for us, but when someone has done something wonderful in general, then we just tell them that (praise them).

*Prayer:* Prayer is an essential part of Christian life and worship. We often use the word "prayer" in reference to anytime we talk to God. This is a fine use, but the original use of the word specifically focuses on asking or even begging for something. God wants us to ask for what we or others need.

Confession: The basic meaning of the word "confess" is "to tell." Therefore, confessing sins is simply telling God about the choices and mistakes that we feel bad about. One tricky aspect of confession is the explanation of what it "does." Are we forgiven when we confess (and therefore, what we do not confess is not forgiven), or are we forgiven everything, even without confessing? The Lutheran response is that we are forgiven of all of our sins, past, present, and future, confessed and unconfessed, when we are connected to Jesus in faith (more on that in the Adult Ed).

The April Council meeting was held on April 9, 2024.

- Paul Reier met with a second experienced local HVAC firm that is preparing an estimate for HVAC replacement. Total project cost may approach \$500,000.
- Nominations are in progress for Council and a position on the Endowment Committee.
- Welcoming initiative updates include: a) completed changes to bathroom and installed new sign for all-gender upstairs bathroom; b) initiated creation of a core team to lead congregation in becoming a Reconciling in Christ Partner; and c) seeking contractor estimates for installation of automatic swinging accessible doors to church building.
- Nancy Carter spoke to Council about Technology Committee work, including audiovisual (AV) system, website, training for volunteers, and more. Council expressed gratitude for Nancy, the tech team and AV volunteers.
- Julie Meeks is contacting local laundromats to explore potential for Laundry Love outreach.

The next Council meeting is scheduled for May 14.

Our final joint service will be on "God's Work. Our Hands. Sunday" on **September 8**, which will give us some extra time for a service project that morning.



## **MUSIC NOTES** Easter Season Liturgy – Setting Six



For this Easter Season, St. Stephen is currently using Liturgical Setting Six\* from our Evangelical Lutheran Worship Hymnal (2006). The source of almost all of this setting's music is not original to our ELW hymnal but borrowed from other resources. The music of Setting Six is in a Gospel style and comes from two previous publications: the *Detroit Folk Mass* (Fortress Press, 1986) and *This Far By Faith: An African American Resource for Worship* (Augsburg Fortress, 1999), our church's African American hymnal. The hymnody in *This Far by Faith* includes a rich selection of songs and styles derived principally from Africa, the United States, and the Caribbean. Just as in our ELW, the structure of this hymnal includes a preface along with Scriptures and

prayers for various occasions. Also included in the opening pages of *This Far by Faith* are articles on the Worship and culture as well performance practices from an African-American perspective. Another interesting tidbit... this Hymnal was developed by a cooperative inter-church process involving the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America and the Lutheran Church – Missouri Synod. You will note that the cover of this hymnal is adorned with only a cross, based on a carved motif from a Yoruba wooden door in Nigeria.

This Far by Faith includes two musical settings of liturgy. Here is where things become a little complicated. Setting One is called the *River of Life* Setting. Our "Gospel Acclamation" and our "Holy, Holy, Holy" that we are currently singing (ELW, Setting Six) come from that *River of Life* setting. But wait, those pieces were not original to that hymnal either, but a part of another liturgy called the *Detroit Folk Mass*, composed by Tillis Butler (d. 2002) and James Harris published back in 1986. Therefore, this music originated just before the merger (1988) of the Lutheran Church in America, the Association of Evangelical Lutheran Churches, and The American Lutheran Church that form our current ELCA. The second musical setting in *This Far by Faith* is called *Liturgy of Joy* by James Capers (b. 1948). We sing our hymn of praise "This is the feast" and the "Lamb of God" from that setting. Most agree that all these compositions are written in a style appropriate for piano accompaniment.

\* Our Cranberry colored ELW has 10 liturgical settings. These are musical renderings for the Kyrie, the Hymn of Praise (Glory to God or This is the Feast), the Gospel Acclamation, the Sanctus (Holy, Holy, Holy), and the Agnus Dei (Lamb of God). A couple of the settings include a Nunc Dimittis (Now, Lord, you let your servant go in peace). During Lent, we used Setting Ten; during Advent, we used Setting Five. For the Epiphany season we sang Setting Eleven from our *All Creation Sings* hymnal supplement.

#### STEWARDSHIP ESSENTIALS

Our second lesson in worship on the fourth Sunday in Easter came from the third chapter of First John. In it, the author asks a rather demanding question. By that I mean the question demands our serious consideration. He asks, "How does God's love abide in anyone who has the world's goods and sees a brother or sister in need and yet refuses help?" It's easy for us to read right over this question and keep on going. But John (tradition holds that the author of the three letters and of the gospel are the same, and his name is John) isn't just asking a rhetorical question. It seems to me that he cannot understand how it is possible to live in God's love, to be governed by God's love, and not share God's love wherever a compassionate response is needed. So he asks, "If you live in God's love, how can you not respond to others in love - always?"

In the context of this question, I wish to shine your light, brothers and sisters. For you have responded generously in love to the needs of our neighbors burdened by crushing amounts of medical debt. For the second year you have exceeded all expectations in your giving to our Lenten offering in support of RIP Medical Debt. Last year's donation total was three times our goal of \$1,800. So we were hopeful that by again designating RIP as our Lenten offering our donations would again be strong. Well, they were - they totaled \$9,655 at last count! Again, your generosity and compassion has overwhelmed me! If giving to meet others' needs is indeed a benchmark for living in God's love, then I would say that St. Stephen congregation manifests that love most remarkably.

I have said before that my favorite definition of stewardship is "what one does after one says, 'I believe.'" Well, based on this, we have some mighty good stewards among us. May God's love continue to hold us, shape us, and guide us as we seek to grow as stewards of God's love and mercy.



# STAYING HEALTHY -PHYSICALLY AND MENTALLY

Physical activity can help you to feel your best. Whether you are just getting started or an experienced athlete, moving with intention can increase your chances of living a longer life. You should get some aerobic exercise and muscle strengthening exercise.

Aerobic activity is movement that gets your heart beating faster and increases your breathing. Examples would be walking fast, jogging or running. These can be done outside to be able to enjoy the scenery or inside if you experience allergies or other conditions that make outdoors uncomfortable.

Muscle strengthening activities are aimed at making your muscles stronger. There are many ways to do this. You can use weights, machines, resistance bands or even bodyweight such as push-ups.

The benefits of physical activity include increased control of blood pressure, blood sugar and weight. It helps to lower bad cholesterol and raise good cholesterol which also helps to reduce the risk of heart disease. It can also help to lower the chances of type 2 diabetes and decrease the risk of certain types of cancer.

Being active not only helps you physically, it helps you mentally. It helps to boost your mood, to sleep better, to decrease chances of being depressed and helps you to feel better about yourself. When you are stronger, your risk of falls is decreased and you feel more confident. Even if you have health conditions or disabilities, talk to your doctor. There are many ways to increase activity.

How do I get started? Some good ways to get started is to walk or ride a bike. Make it a social thing and invite a friend. The time passes quickly. If you like watching TV, grab a couple of hand weights, stand up and do a little workout while watching. You can also do push-ups or planks during commercials.

I hope to see you on a trail someday.

#### It Doesn't Take a Catastrophe...

A lot of people feel that you only need to get a Stephen Minister if you have gone through a major catastrophe. For example, they feel like you should get one if you have had a death in the family or maybe if you are going through a divorce or if you have been diagnosed with cancer or some other potentially life-changing situation. While people in those situations definitely could find walking with a Stephen Minister very helpful, Stephen Ministers can be of great help in other less dramatic situations as well.

Any situation that leads to persistent sadness, depression, or anxiety that won't let up with the usual support provided by discussions with family or friends. Or perhaps the situation may be brought on or aggravated by the usual supports and they may not be available to provide the way to work it out. Or perhaps the situation may be a source of some embarrassment and discussing it with family or close friends may add further discomfort. In such situations, issues that may seem trivial or non-major to the big picture can lead to long term discomfort and consternation. Meeting with a Stephen Minister for confidential, thoughtful listening and prayerful discussion could be extremely helpful.

In short, no problem is too small to seek help. If problems persist and the usual support systems have not been helpful or have not been available, don't hesitate to speak up and request a Stephen Minister. Women are counseled by female Stephen Ministers and men by male Stephen Ministers. If you feel that you would like to have a Stephen Minister, contact one of the **Pastors** or **Bill Dichtel**.


