PENTECOST

May in Virginia is dominated by the season of spring, as such it is quite fitting that we will spend most of May still in the church season of Easter. Easter and spring both draw us into the contemplation new life and new beginnings; both of which we have in our Risen Lord, Jesus Christ. That being said, however, I want to focus on the last Sunday of May instead, being Pentecost Sunday.

I have said before that though we celebrate Easter only once a year, and the Easter season for only seven Sundays, we **always** live in the Easter light and good news; and Pentecost is exactly how we live in that Easter light and good news. The Good News is given: Christ is Risen! Christ is Risen, indeed! Alleluia! And Pentecost marks the coming of the Holy Spirit upon the followers of Christ and the beginning of the spreading of that Good News, the beginnings of the church, the beginnings of Christian evangelism, and the beginnings of the wildfire spread of Christianity throughout the world.

Luther speaks of the gift of the Holy Spirit in one of his Pentecost sermons, saying: "Observe here, the Holy Spirit descends and fills the hearts of the disciples sitting in fear and sorrow. The Holy Spirit renders their tongues fiery and cloven, and inflames them with love unto boldness in preaching Christ — unto free and fearless utterance. Plainly, then, it is not the office of the Spirit to write books or to institute laws. The Holy Spirit writes in the hearts of all, creating a new heart, so that all may rejoice before God, filled with love for God and ready, in consequence, to serve others gladly." (Martin Luther: The Gift of the Holy Spirit—Commentary on Acts 2:1-13)

Pentecost frees us to speak of God's love for, and activity in, all of creation. Even in fear and sorrow the Holy Spirit works, filling us to overflowing and inflaming us with love. What an appropriate word Luther uses in this sermon, "inflames them," for this is exactly what the Holy Spirit does, "inflames" us to boldness in proclaiming Christ and readying us to serve God and our neighbor. The Holy Spirit does not inflame us to silence or to simply feeling good about ourselves. Rather, the Holy Spirit inflames us to go out into the world, go out into relationships with others in order to preach, love, and serve.

Everything about our Parish needs to be "inflamed": our programs, our meetings, our preschool, our faith formation, our bible studies, our service work, and perhaps most importantly our worship. Everything about our worship ought to be aimed at this "inflaming." Rather than getting caught up in how worship makes us feel, or the nitty-gritty of how our worship happens, we need to pay attention to how our worship "inflames" us to rejoice in God, "inflames" us to be filled to overflowing with God's love, "inflames" us to preach our Risen Lord to the world, and "inflames" us to serve God and neighbor.

Despite what season our church calendar says it is, every Sunday of the church year we celebrate Easter. And every Sunday of the church year we ought to be reminded of how we celebrate Easter, through Pentecost. As we enjoy the changing of the seasons, as we gear up for summer vacations, planting, and all the things that will fill our lives June through August; let us be ever mindful of our "inflaming" by the Holy Spirit.

- Nominations for the two members of the Endowment Committee that will be leaving have been made. Members will be voted on in the June Meeting as well as any nominees from the floor.
- Sandy Croushore, Roberta Sulouff, and Julie Meeks, the three council members whose terms are ending, would like to continue for a second term.
- The Executive Committee as well as Roberta Sulouff and JR Lyons will meet with Our Savior's Lutheran Church members and Pastor to further discuss our Shared Ministry Plans. The meeting is scheduled for April 17 at Our Savior's.
- A motion to approve the hiring of the new Preschool Director, Holly Ready, was made and passed unanimously. Holly has a Bachelor of Psychology and a Master in Educational Leadership. She has a child that is already enrolled in our preschool.
- LSA members are tentatively scheduled to be lead worship on April 30
- Council discussed ways that we can implement our Ministry Plan, some ideas include:
 - Initiate a "Dinner club," sometimes called "Tables of 8," where a variety of members would group together and rotate food and fellowship.
 - Create a social opportunity for members that are homebound or don't travel well to have interaction more often than communion and pastoral home visits.
 - Create a group of parents that are dealing with children that have mental health issues.
 - Combine efforts to reach out to members that have not been to church in a while and

- ask how they are doing, and do they need anything.
- Create a prayer ministry that meets every week and prays for a small section of the congregation.
- Attend activities of the congregation's children and families

ON MEDICAID?

MAKE SURE YOUR CONTACT INFORMATION IS UP TO DATE

Beginning this month (May), and continuing for about one year, Virginia Medicaid will be redetermining if people with Medicaid coverage are still eligible. Medicaid is the federal-state program that provides health coverage for low-income families, children and persons with disabilities. Most people who have been on Medicaid since before the pandemic are likely to be enrolled automatically and will receive a notice that their coverage will continue. But if someone became eligible during the pandemic, and/or their income changed, they might no longer be eligible.

If you or someone you know is on Medicaid, an up-todate mailing address and phone number are needed. You can check your information or report changes:

- Online at commonhelp.virginia.gov
- Call Cover Virginia at 1 855-242-8282
- Call local Department of Social Services
- Contacting your Medicaid Managed Care Organization (Medicaid Health Plan)

Federal rules during the pandemic instructed states to stop redetermining Medicaid eligibility and allow anyone who qualified to remain continuously enrolled. This was to protect the access for care for those individuals and to protect the broader community during a time of widespread infectious disease. The pandemic has been declared over, thus the redeterminations for coverage begin again.

If someone no longer qualifies for Medicaid and does not have access to employer-provided health coverage, the next best option is signing up the HealthCare.gov, the Affordable Care Act coverage. Four in five customers will be able to find coverage for \$10 or less per month after subsidies.

Those who know me well know that I love nature. A single hour spent walking through College Woods restores my hope for the future. Standing and watching a sunrise or sunset unfold in all its splendor is almost as good as dying and going to heaven. Plop me down in the middle of Yosemite or the Grand Canyon and I could ask for nothing better. And heavens, there is nothing that can leave me so awestruck as the Milky Way spread across the dark night time sky of the desert Southwest! This part of God's Creation which we know is so awesome! As God is awesome!

I truly love my experience of the world God has made. Yet, my joy in it is tinged with sorrow these days. And together we can grow as God's Stewards of Creation.

STEPHEN MINISTRY AT ST. STEPHEN



IF I'M FEELING LONELY, SHOULD I ARRANGE TO GET A STEPHEN MINISTER?

That's a very reasonable question to ask and one that is not as far off base as some of you may think. Certainly, loneliness is a universal emotion. We all have felt alone at some times in our lives, and loneliness can lead to significant depression if it persists for a long time or if there does not appear to be any relief in sight.

The first thing to do if you are sitting around feeling lonely is to do some simple analysis. What has changed in your life to make these feelings of loneliness come on?

- Have you lost your best friend? Has he or she lost interest in your friendship, moved away, or even passed away? Well, with such a loss leading to your loneliness, having a thoughtful, caring Stephen Minister to talk with could prove invaluable.
- Has your routine changed? For example, a lot of us experienced loneliness with the changes brought on by the isolation of the Covid Pandemic and while telephone calls helped bridge the gap, they were not true replacements for face-to-face visits!
- Do you feel like your friends' interests have changed and no longer match what interests you? That can erode friendships and lead to loneliness. In such situations, you probably don't need a Stephen Minister, you just need to make a point of getting out into the congregation or other social groups, meeting others, and finding others with common interests. Sometimes that takes some work on your part, but it definitely pays off!

The great news is that we are a congregation full of outgoing and friendly parishioners who are easy to talk to: It is generally quite easy to strike up a conversation and meet people before and after church. Before you know it, that can become a friendly meeting or two at a coffee shop and often the feelings of loneliness will

quickly dissipate. Just calling up a church acquaintance for phone talk can be an ice breaker as well.

Sometimes, the loneliness is deeper than that and is actually covering feelings of depression. The reasons for those feelings are sometimes clear and obvious. However, they sometimes are hidden from our conscious thinking. Sometimes, the feelings are too hidden, too laden with emotion or too painful for us to truly register. In such cases, getting a Stephen Minister assigned who can serve as a thoughtful and careful listener and guide in eliciting deeper thoughts and feelings can be invaluable.

In summary, we all experience loneliness at times: It is a part of the human experience. However, if simple and available remedies are not helping, reach out. Getting assistance from a Stephen Minister could be a big help! If you feel you may benefit from a Stephen Minister, talk to **Pastor Nelson** or call **Bill Dichtel**, Leader of our Stephen Ministry group.
