SAINTS

On All Saints Sunday we give thanks for the saints who have gone before us, for the saints still among us, and for the saints of God still to come. We give thanks for the examples of faithful living that the saints have given us as they navigated the stormy waters of life, and also for the faithful acts of service we are empowered by God's Holy Spirit to do in our own seas. We give thanks, too, for the fullness of eternal life in which the saints of God who have gone before us now partake and which we have yet to fully enjoy.

The custom of commemorating the saints of the church, especially martyrs, on a single day originated in the fourth century. By the eighth century, the festival commemorating all saints had been moved in England and Ireland to November 1 in order to Christianize the Celtic harvest festival of Samhain which marked the beginning of winter and communal attention to the dead. In current Christian use, the day is dedicated to thanksgiving for all the unnamed who died in the Lord. In many assemblies, the names of the local dead are read aloud, a focus originally associated with All Souls Day on November 2. The conflation of the two emphases fits with the Protestant belief that the all the Christian dead are saints and none needs release from purgatory.

This year we will celebrate the lives of saints who have died in faith on Sunday, November 5. In our worship we will have candles lit in their memory and will pray in thanksgiving for their faithful witness to us. While we traditionally recognize the saints we have lost during the past year, we also invite the congregation to share the

names of any saints you would like to recognize on this Festival Sunday.

I would also like to invite you into a time of reflection this month. Through the work of the Holy Spirit we have been given the gift of faith. That work often comes to us through the witness of loved ones. Perhaps it was a beloved grandparent, Sunday school teacher, or friend who helped nurture in you the faith of/in Christ. I would invite you to reflect on all the people who have had a hand in your faith; and the many ways that the Holy Spirit has spoken to you through others. And with those saints in mind, I would invite you to give thanks to God for them. And if some of those saints are still living, I would also encourage you to give them a call, send them a card, or find some other way to express your thanks to them for being a part of your faith journey.

We are richly blessed; and we are called to share those blessings with others. We have been witnessed to; and we are called to witness to others. I trust that someday (perhaps even now) someone will be giving thanks to God for the witness you were/are to them!

We pray: Almighty God, you have knit your people together in one communion in the mystical body of your Son, Jesus Christ our Lord. Grant us grace to follow your blessed saints in lives of faith and commitment, and to know the inexpressible joys you have prepared for those who love you, through Jesus Christ, our Savior and Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever. Amen.

Our October meeting was held on October 10, 2023.

- There was continued discussion of our HVAC system replacement options after some Council members and Pastor Nelson recently met with a consulting engineer. We are awaiting cost estimates for replacement of the existing system (similar type but new), and for a new heat pump system alternative.
- The St. Stephen Lutheran Church and Our Saviour's Lutheran Church shared ministry team is meeting to review and discuss shared ministry progress, as well as compensation for Pastor Sheppard-Witt.
- A review of St. Stephen's ministry plan shows clear progress in many areas and opportunities for continued focus.
- Installation of the new console for our sound board is planned for early December.
- Council discussed our recent building security system upgrades. Information/clarification to the congregation about key fob use is forthcoming.
- We are seeking input from an electrician or electrical engineer regarding lighting problems in the worship space. Troubleshooting by a Council member is underway.
- Our Finance team continues work on the budget, which Council votes on in December.

The next Council meeting is scheduled for November 14.

CAMPUS MINISTRY



At a recent Region 9 Lutheran Campus Ministry Network (LuMin) meeting, we were introduced to a new LuMin initiative/course entitled "On Campus for Good." I've signed up for it and will be talking more in-depth with our Campus

Ministry team. The resource developed as a desire to provide congregations with an in-depth guide to starting a campus ministry. What came out of it was this resource - which is also being used by existing campus ministries to reimagine or re-energize their ministry with students.

But in our conversation with one of the leads, Chris Heavner, the title of the program sticks with me. "On Campus for Good." What does it mean to be on campus for "good?" We've had an established ministry with William & Mary since 1956. Like with congregational ministry in general, it is easy to get into the routines, the rhythms, the cycles and lose sight of the "why" we do something - the whys of worship, of fellowship, of service. We do it just because we do it. But getting to the deeper whys provide a basis for excitement and engagement.

It is something that we must think about (and remind ourselves to think about). Why do we do Campus Ministry? What do we hope that the students will get out of it? What do we hope that the congregation will get out of it? What do we hope for in the wider communities of William & Mary and Williamsburg? How does Campus Ministry and LSA fit into the wider mission and vision of St. Stephen, a God-called and a Godgathered community serving in this place? How is this ministry centered in our faith in the love of God made known in Jesus?

I hope to be exploring these kinds of questions with the Campus Ministry committee, as we dream and imagine this ministry for today and into the future. When I was a child, our family always (not just sometimes, but always) celebrated Thanksgiving with the Whipples. Russ and my father were best of friends. They had been college roommates before going off to war in 1942. After the war they spent a couple of months together in England and Norway exploring their family roots. They both moved to California after returning to the US, and were one another's best men at their weddings. Clearly, their friendship meant much to each man, and they made a point of expressing that in our yearly Thanksgiving celebrations.

Now, 60 years later, I still give God thanks for the way our families supported one another through the years. I also give thanks for teachers, coaches, youth leaders and neighbors who were such a big part of my growing into the person I am today. And I could fill a couple of pages if I were to try to list all the blessings that have made a difference in my life (but for brevity's sake I won't try). Truly, I am greatly blessed. And it is because I have been richly blessed that Thanksgiving can be such a conflicted time for me. You see, I know that so many others do not have similar blessings in their lives.

All around the world people have struggles where I have blessings. Our southern border is overwhelmed by people fleeing violence and crushing poverty in Central America. The Rohingya, Uighur and other peoples endure systemic oppression and even genocide in their homelands. Ukrainians and others live with the constant fear of missiles and bombs falling from the sky. And crushing poverty is the reality of a billion people around the world. So, while I'm giving thanks for my blessings, I'm also wanting others to share in God's blessings.

I can't make the world's problems go away; but I can make them just a little less. The hours I spend volunteering in our community make a difference to some. The money I donate to our church and to church-related organizations touch the lives of even more people with tangible signs of God's love. And while I can't give enough to change the world, when my gifts are combined with the gifts of others, change does happen.

As you consider your blessings this year and give God thanks, I invite you to consider also the needs of others of God's beloved children. Like Abraham (see Genesis 12), we have been blessed in order to be a blessing to others. Let us be a blessing together as we generously share what we have with those whose needs are great. Together, by God's grace, we can and will change the world.

The Holidays are Coming!

Fall has finally arrived and with it comes back to school, special holidays and events, and the pressure that all these extra activities and responsibilities can generate. Trying to fit in with all the holiday activities with the routine of life can be frustrating and confusing. You want to get everything possible done to meet your obligations and keep the family happy. But there may not seem to be enough time to make everybody happy and maintain your sanity.

This feeling is sometimes referred to as "holiday blues." It comes from trying to meet expectations from friends and relatives, your own wishes to make friends and family happy and recapturing the experience of happy times from the past. There are many articles available in health journals that give good advice about limiting eating and drinking and getting enough sleep and exercise. This is good advice to follow, but it is difficult to handle by yourself.

You have read in former bulletins that Stephen Ministry provides a calm environment where your concerns can be discussed in confidence. With the advancing holidays the program can also be an oasis of calm and healing that will let you focus on the important matters for yourself and your family. Taking the time out for even an hour a week can regenerate your enthusiasm for family, friends and holiday traditions.

You do not have to shoulder these burdens alone. The gift Stephen Ministry brings to us at St. Stephen is that you do not have to suffer the burdens of holiday stress and family demands by yourself. Just being able to talk to someone who gives you their undivided attention during a quiet meeting time can help you focus on what is important in your own life.

Meeting with a Stephen Minister does not mean a longterm commitment. You may just need to have some time out from the frenzied activity that surrounds to get another view and have a quiet "time out." There are many things that can contribute to the holiday blues. Whether it is something as simple as overscheduling yourself or a deeper emotional need, it is possible to work through your feelings and start anew.

A Stephen Minister is fully present in the moment with you and can help you focus on your thoughts and the emotions that accelerate your anxieties. In a calm, personal environment, you can look at your concerns calmly and perhaps understand that your concerns can be managed and that there is nothing that you cannot handle. Because you are no longer alone.

THANKSGIVING AND GIVING THANKS

The holidays come with high expectations that can lead to sadness, anxiety or depression. If you suffer from depression or severe anxiety, seek professional help. If, however, you feel lost, overwhelmed or a little down, there is good news for you. Being grateful has scientific studies to show it will help improve general malaise. The word gratitude is derived from the Latin word *gratia*, which means grace or grateful. Gratitude is thankful appreciation for what you have whether tangible or intangible. Gratitude is associated with greater happiness.

Gratitude can be expressed in the past by remembering a happier time in life, the present by being aware and appreciative for what we have now, and the future by being optimistic about things to come. There are ways to cultivate gratitude:

- Saying thank you or writing a thank you note not only provides uplift for you, but also the recipient of your thanks. It will help to nurture your relationship as well.
- To even say thank you mentally will bring warm feelings to you as think about the kindness for which you are thankful.
- Keep a gratitude journal. Writing down one thing daily that you are thankful for will start the day on a positive note.
- Count your blessings. Try to sit down once weekly and write down the things you feel are blessings in your life.
- Meditation helps you to focus on the present moment without judgement. You can focus on things such as the warmth of the sun or the sound of the wind and feel grateful.
- Prayer, in all its many forms, is another way to express gratitude.

Whatever you choose to do, let this be a Thanksgiving full of happiness and gratitude for you and yours.


