BAPTISM

As we prepare for the upcoming program year and all the excitement and busy-ness that entails, let's take a moment to remember why we do much of what we do. Our baptismal promises; or, more accurately, our baptismal identity. We engage in faith formation, in worship, in ministry, in education, in outreach, in proclamation, in advocacy, and in so much more. And why? It's our identity. It's who God created us to be. People putting faith into action. So let's revisit the promises that help shape our baptismal identity.

*"to live among God's faithful people,
to hear the word of God and share in the Lord's supper,
to proclaim the good news of God in Christ through
word and deed,
to serve all people, following the example of Jesus,
and to strive for justice and peace in all the earth..."*
(ELW Rite of Baptism)

Quite the promises we are making! And they are powerful and foundational promises too. When we place these promises at the center of our lives, at the center of our communities, at the center of our faith life; we live as God created us to live. But it can be awfully easy to forget, overlook, or minimize these promises. Not to mention the numerous distractions that call us to live in unrighteous ways. We can be forever thankful that God's grace comes to us in each and every moment, calling us back to the Way, back to these promises, when we go astray.

As we start our program year, full of fun and exciting opportunities for growth and connection, let's place our baptismal promises at the center of our communal life. As we prepare for faith formation, the Women's Retreat, our Theologian in Residence program, choir practices

and all sorts of other ministries, let's be drawn back to where our faith journeys all began, the waters and promises of baptism.

We commit to living in faith communities, seeking to participate in some small fashion, in the Kingdom (or Kin-dom) of God in the here-and-now. We commit to engaging with the Word of God, whether through personal study, education opportunities, or sermons, we take scripture seriously. We commit to regularly encountering the grace of God through the sacraments, those earthly reminders and signs to which our faith can cling. We commit to proclaiming the radical and revolutionary Gospel in word and in deed; grounding our actions in the teachings of Jesus Christ. We commit to meeting people where they are and accepting them as who they are, as Christ himself did; being radically inclusive, even to those society tells us to reject. We commit to striving for justice and peace...God's justice and peace...in all the earth.

These are no easy tasks! But we can give thanks not only for God's continual grace, but also for the Holy Spirit who accompanies us and works in us and through us to keep these promises. And there is perhaps no greater way in which the Holy Spirit keeps us on the Way than through the support of our community. This is a big part of why the Rite of Baptism includes promises made by the congregation as well: "People of God, do you promise to support and pray for one another in your life in Christ?" For we cannot keep these promises on our own! We need the Holy Spirit and the community the Spirit gathers us into.

With these guiding promises we can be certain our efforts this year will be Kingdom and Kin-dom building! I leave you with the closing prayer of the Baptismal Rite: "We give you thanks, O God, that through water

and the Holy Spirit you give us new birth, cleanse us from sin, and raise us to eternal life. Stir up in your people the gift of your Holy Spirit: the spirit of wisdom and understanding, the spirit of counsel and might, the spirit of knowledge and the fear of the Lord, the spirit of joy in your presence both now and forever. Amen."

FOLLOW YOUR MONEY!!



When you contribute to St. Stephen, either through weekly envelopes, by cash or loose check, automatic deposit, or Qualified Charitable Distribution (QCD) from your IRA, your contribution is counted and recorded weekly by our tellers. After checking for accuracy the Financial Secretary posts this information, as you have designated, in our Church Windows software program. Your financial statements are generated from this data.

St. Stephen's finances consist of assets (bank and investment accounts) and liabilities (mortgage). Our assets are divided into funds which include the General Operating Fund and other funds set up for specific purposes.

- The General Operating Fund is governed by the budget that is approved by the congregation every January. The detailed budget for 2025 can be found in the Annual Report. The treasurer pays all bills from this fund for our day-to-day ministries including staff compensation, office expenses, utilities, mortgage payments, all program expenses (Faith Formation, Youth, Worship & Music, etc.), and Synod and local benevolences that are budgeted. A monthly report of all these transactions is provided to the Council for their approval.
- The Building Fund is funded through the yellow Building Fund envelopes, automatic deposits and QCD's and may be used to pay part of our current mortgage payments on our church building and to pay for major unbudgeted building projects.
- The HVAC Project Fund was set up for the recent renovation of our HVAC system in 2024. Whatever money that has accumulated in this fund after July 2027 will be used to pay down

principal on our mortgage, and the fund will be closed.

- The Memorial Fund receives contributions in memory or in honor of individuals. This money is used for specific items like altar linens, hymnals, choir robes, as a need arises or as directed by the donor.
- The Endowment Fund receives all bequests from wills and estates as well as outright contributions. It was established in 2006 in order to be able to finance, on a continuing basis, activities beyond the scope of St. Stephen's ordinary operations. A designated percentage of the income generated can be used for a number of purposes such as the Theologian in Residence program, outreach programs, scholarships, or seed money for new ministry programs.
- Additional funds include the Ballentine Scholarship Fund, the Preschool Endowment Fund, the Jean Kuhn Social Ministry Fund, the Homeless Ministry Fund, the Music Fund, and the Pastor's Discretionary Fund. Contributions can be made to any of these funds at any time. In addition, all contributions designated for specific campaigns such as Godparents for Tanzania, World Hunger, United Lutheran Appeal, Grove, Avalon, FISH, etc., flow through St. Stephen by the process described in the first paragraph and are directed to their designated recipients.

STEPHEN MINISTRY AT ST. STEPHEN



"I am about to do a new thing; now it springs forth, do you not perceive it? I will make a way in the wilderness and rivers in the desert." – Isaiah 43:19

Friends, there is much to grieve this year. Many in our congregation experienced loss of loved ones, employment, health, or relationships this year. For the rest of us, there is the nonstop crisis of neighbors abducted by ICE agents, LGBTQ people, people of color, and women losing their rights, and all of us facing the loss of Medicare and other social services. At times, the sorrow seems never-ending.

Yet, as followers of the way of Christ, we believe in the promise of the resurrection. I believe that goes beyond a life after physical death. I think our God is constantly creating new life if only we are ready to perceive it.

For Stephen Ministers, we see this in the possible paths of healing after a crisis. Those who take time to work through and honor their loss with a loving companion – like a Stephen Minister – can indeed find a greater sense of healing and wholeness. Some care receivers report greater joy than even before their crisis began.

To be clear – I'm not suggesting anyone's suffering and loss is a "part of God's plan" or something that "had to happen." Tragedy is often senseless, and God never puts it on us intentionally. Period. I am suggesting that God is Love and will do whatever it takes to create a new, joyous life for you. Our role as Stephen Ministers is to keep our eye on that new life God is making and to hold you in love until you can perceive it too.
