As We Gather

During this long season of Pentecost, the general theme is growth in faith, deepened trust in God. It seems that theme of the First Reading and Gospel story this Sunday is receiving the courage to do and say what God calls us to do!

Amos 7:7-15 – Here’s your scavenger hunt item for this Sunday: find this story from Amos in our stained glass! When God called Amos, God was working around the institutional structures of politics and religion. Amos was not a prophet attached to temples of royal courts. Rather, he was an ordinary farmer called by God to speak to the king. Notice how God’s word of judgment through Amos conflicted with the king’s court prophet, Amaziah!

Mark 6:14-29 – What a story! The king, Herod Antipas, has jailed John the Baptizer. Herod is afraid of John, and he is also troubled and captivated by what John says. At a banquet, driven by ego and hubris, Herod makes a public promise that backfires. Herod’s wife, Herodias, “had a grudge against” John because his criticisms threaten her marriage that gives her power. She seizes on an opportunity to force Herod to execute John.

"See, I am setting a plumb line
in the midst of my people Israel;
I will never again pass them by;

⁹the high places of Isaac shall be made desolate,
and the sanctuaries of Israel shall be laid waste,
and I will rise against the house of Jeroboam with the sword."

¹⁰Then Amaziah, the priest of Bethel, sent to King Jeroboam of Israel, saying, "Amos has conspired against you in the very center of the house of Israel; the land is not able to bear all his words. ¹¹For thus Amos has said,

'Jeroboam shall die by the sword,
and Israel must go into exile
away from his land.'

¹²And Amaziah said to Amos, "O seer, go, flee away to the land of Judah, earn your bread there, and prophesy there; ¹³but never again prophesy at Bethel, for it is the king's sanctuary, and it is a temple of the kingdom."

¹⁴Then Amos answered Amaziah, "I am no prophet, nor a prophet's son; but I am a herdsman, and a dresser of sycamore trees, ¹⁵and the Lord took me from following the flock, and the Lord said to me, 'Go, prophesy to my people Israel.'"

Gospel

Mark 6:14-29

Response after announcement of the Gospel: "Glory to you, O Lord."

¹⁴King Herod heard of the disciples' preaching, for Jesus' name had become known. Some were saying, "John the baptizer has been raised from the dead; and for this reason these powers are at work in him." ¹⁵But others said, "It is Elijah." And others said, "It is a prophet, like one of the prophets of old." ¹⁶But when Herod heard of it, he said, "John, whom I beheaded, has been raised."

¹⁷For Herod himself had sent men who arrested John, bound him, and put him in prison on account of Herodias, his brother Philip's wife, because Herod had married her. ¹⁸For John had been telling Herod, "It is not lawful for you to have your brother's wife." ¹⁹And Herodias had a grudge against him, and wanted to kill him. But she could not, ²⁰for Herod feared John, knowing that he was a righteous and holy man, and he protected him. When he heard him, he was greatly perplexed; and yet he liked to listen to him. ²¹But an opportunity came when Herod on his birthday gave a banquet for his courtiers and officers and for the leaders of Galilee. ²²When his daughter Herodias came in and danced, she pleased Herod and his guests; and the king said to the girl, "Ask me for whatever you wish, and I will give it." ²³And he solemnly swore to her, "Whatever you ask me, I will give you, even half of my kingdom." ²⁴She went out and said to her mother, "What should I ask for?" She replied, "The head of John the baptizer." ²⁵Immediately she rushed back to the king and requested, "I want you to give me at once the head of John the Baptist on a platter." ²⁶The king was deeply grieved; yet out of regard for his oaths and for the guests, he did not want to refuse her. ²⁷Immediately the king sent a soldier of the guard with orders to bring John's head. He went and beheaded him in the prison, ²⁸brought his head on a platter, and gave it to the girl. Then the girl gave it to her mother. ²⁹When his disciples heard about it, they came and took his body, and laid it in a tomb.





Health Ministry

The Eyes Have It – Part 1

The retina of the eye is a layer of cells at the back of your eye that is sensitive to light and sends signals to your brain that help you to see. The macula is the small area of the retina that has a high concentration of light-sensitive cells. The macula is important for seeing details when you look directly at something. Age-related macular degeneration or (AMD) is a disease that causes the macula to lose its normal structure (that's the degeneration). It causes you to lose the center part of your vision. Things to know:

- AMD is more common in older people
- In severe cases, it can lead to blindness
- Certain vitamins may help slow vision loss

There are two types of AMD.

- Dry AMD-the cells in the macula die slowly and vision loss is steady over a period of time
- Wet AMD-may develop from dry AMD and involves the growth of new, abnormal blood vessels under the damaged macula. Blood will leak out of the vessels causing faster vision loss.

Next week, I will go into possible causes, symptoms, and treatment or prevention. Let me know if you have any questions.
