FAITH AND FREEDOM AT 250

As we near the 250th anniversary of the Declaration of Independence in July 2026, we face a fraught moment in our nation's history. During such times, people of faith often ask: *What is God doing in dark times?*

The U.S. semi-quincentennial offers a chance, and perhaps the responsibility, to reflect on our history and future: to celebrate what is worthy of gratitude, lament what has been broken and unjust, and renew our commitment to the common good. The Constitution is both grounding and aspirational. Its opening phrase, "**We the people**," points to mutual self-determination; power resides with the people, not with a monarch or a religious hierarchy.

But we also must be truthful: at the nation's founding, "**we the people**" narrowly referred to property-owning white men. Through amendments and social movements, civic participation gradually broadened. Although this expansion was imperfect and often full of conflict (mostly thanks to the forces of White Supremacy and Incrementalism), it transformed the nation into a tapestry of diverse histories and voices striving to coexist.

The founders held diverse views on God and the divine, making it hard to say liberty was won in the Lord's name. Our nation is not a vehicle of divine revelation. It is an ongoing human project; messy, sometimes courageous, sometimes cruel, and that is why moral clarity matters.

Our faith calls us to resist distorted patriotism that harms neighbors and endangers vulnerable people.

Chief among these is Christian Nationalism, an idolatrous conflation of God's reign with a specific nation or culture that harms neighbors and endangers vulnerable people.

Christian Nationalism often:

- Fuses cultural power with selective Christian language.
- Undermines the constitutional sovereignty of "**we the people**."
- Marries Christianity to authoritarianism and violent masculinity, recasting Jesus as a warrior.
- Demonizes empathy and love of neighbor by shrinking who counts as "neighbor."

This is not a minor political dispute but a spiritual danger. While nationalism demands ultimate loyalty, the gospel calls us back to the Crucified and Risen One who welcomes outsiders and speaks truth to power. Resisting idolatry is not just critique; it's formation. We resist by being shaped by the Church's prayers and worship, remembering Christian hope isn't based on national greatness.

To truthfully mark 250 years, we must listen to long-excluded voices, especially Womanist, BIPOC, and Queer experiences that shed light on the gospel and the realities of civic life for the marginalized. The prophetic dimension of faith calls us into civic life to support, rather than to dominate, marginalized neighbors. A key test: do our policies protect or burden the vulnerable? Jesus consistently reached out to the marginalized with healing, restoration, and freedom and invited the weary

into rest. How does our participation in civic life reflect these values? Or not?

As we celebrate 250 years, we honor a hopeful democracy and progress toward equality, while resisting cruelty, shame, and fear in politics and religion. We are not powerless. By following Jesus' example (humility, service, love, justice, and truth), we commit to seeking the common good in public life.

What's Happening at Congregation Council

The June meeting of Council was held on Monday, June 8. Roberta Sulouff led devotions with a wonderful description of how meaningful the church community was to her and her family and an opening prayer was offered.

Minutes were then reviewed, lightly amended and approved.

Old business:

- This included the continued finalization of the HVAC System which is still undergoing final inspections and review with the contractor.
- The Website Committee had a brief initial meeting and will meet again July 12 to look at a number of websites and compare and contrast features that would be favorable for our church's website.
- The Call Committee has been working hard and has composed a potential call document.
- The Stewardship Committee is scheduled to meet on June 23 and plan upcoming stewardship activities. Council also discussed the process of updating the church membership roster before those activities to be sure it is up to date and in line with the findings of the recent calling by Nancy Egloff and her committee.
- Nominations to Council were discussed. A couple of potential nominees have agreed to serve if elected to Council. It was again expressed that it would be superb if we can

obtain a youth representative and also a representative with young children as Jeffrey Berry and Roberta Sulouff, who fill those roles, are rotating off Council. New Council members will be elected at the June 28 Congregational Meeting.

- Mention was also made that the Finance Committee could use more members for back-up, and that they do not necessarily need to have professional financial backgrounds.
- The Visioning Process for the church was briefly discussed. This will be very important as we head into the Call Process and as our Music Director will be nearing retirement.

New Business:

- Pastor Jon will be attending Power in the Spirit in July. He also reported that we have four new members to welcome into the congregation at a service sometime this summer, date yet to be arranged.
- The Property Committee reported some plumbing issues with the men's downstairs lavatory which will require installation of a pump. Also, new direction signs have been installed at the entrance and exit to the driveway.

After other brief discussions, a closing prayer was offered and the meeting was adjourned.

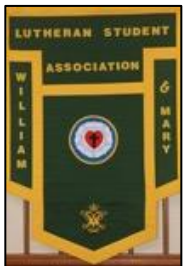
Our final joint service will be on **September 6.**

I enjoy sitting on my porch while it is raining. The sound of rain falling on the leaves and the smell of the rain leave me feeling refreshed. I find myself counting my blessings. I reflect on the things in my life that are most important and some things of which I might need to let go. It is a peaceful time for me. I also realize that there are some people who might not be able to do those things. Sometimes life is stressful and finding this calm may be difficult.

This is where Stephen Ministers are a great resource. Stephen Ministers meet with their care receivers usually once a week. They listen and offer non-judgmental support. It does not matter what might be happening in your life. It may be grief over the loss of a loved one or close friend. It may be divorce or marital difficulties. It may be difficult relationships with family members.

Stephen Ministers do not take the place of a professional counselor. We will work in conjunction with counselors if needed. While Stephen Ministers will give Christ-centered care and support, we do not take the place of pastoral counseling. The most important thing is that Stephen Ministers provide caring support in a quiet and confidential manner.

If you find yourself in a position where you feel you may need this type of care, please reach out to **Pastor Jon** or **Bill Dichtel, Stephen Leader**. If you think someone is struggling, please let us know as we can reach out to them. Do you think you might have what it takes to be a Stephen Minister, please reach out. We would love to talk to you.

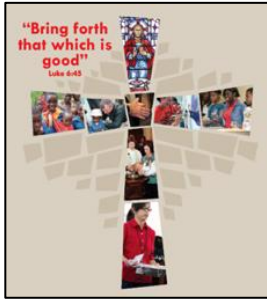

1956 SOCIETY DINNER 2026 SAYS "THANK YOU FOR GIVING"



The St. Stephen Endowment Fund held its annual 1956 Society Dinner at Ford's Colony Club House on June 18. A special treat for this year included performances by an ensemble of the St. Stephen Ringers Bell Choir to celebrate the replacement of the old bell

carriers with new carriers for transporting and storing the bells. The purchase was made possible with funds from the Endowment Fund.

Invited guests included the Kharooty family who immigrated to Williamsburg from Afghanistan via Germany in 2025, to join other family members seeking better opportunities for themselves and their children. St. Stephen is helping support the family with housing and tuition assistance, including monetary contributions from the Endowment Fund.

In a question-and-answer session after dinner, **Wais Kharooty** explained that *"no one is willing to leave everything behind. We are very grateful to be here. Since the return of the Taliban, girls can no longer go to school for any education. They stay at home and do nothing. My wife can go to school here, and plans to do so in a medical field."*

Wais has completed his first year at the Mason School of Business at William & Mary toward a Master's Degree. He closed his comments: *"We make our parents proud that they see us here in freedom and able to further our careers with education. Our parents are also relieved that we have met good people. We will never forget the help that we have received. I will carry this experience with me my entire life. And we will never break your trust in us."*
